THERE was also a Board of twelve arbitrators appointed. The by laws were then adopted and the meeting adjourned to meet at Montague on Thursday Jan. 22nd at 7 o'clock when matters of importance to this part of the country will be discussed.

### QUEEN SQUARE GARDENS.

The adjourned meeting of citizens to receive report of the committee of management of the Queen Square Gardens was held last evening in the City Council Chamber. His Worship Mayor Warburton presided. The undersigned was appointed Secretary.

Horace Haszard reported that the present committee was appointed to office in 1891 at a meeting of citizens presided over by the late Mayor Haviland. At that time there was considerable debt against the gardens but this indebtedness had been gradually paid off until today he was pleased to announce there was no outstanding liability. The grants received from the Federal Local and Civic Governments amounted yearly to the sum of \$800. This sum had been expended annually in the maintenance of the Gardens, the payment of the gardener's salary and the liquidation of the old debt. Mr. Haszard submitted the annual accounts from 1891 to 1902 inclusive, with the auditors' certificates attached, which were received and adopted and handed to the Mayor. Mr. Haszard then tendered his resignation as a member of the committee, stating that he felt he had served sufficiently long and that the responsibility of this management should be taken up by other citizens.

S. W. Crabbe for similar reasons asked to be relieved from further service on this committee.

On motion of Rev. T. F. Fallerton, seconded by George E. Hughes, M. L. A., the meeting unanimously adopted a vote of thanks to the retiring members of the Committee for their efficient management of the Gardens, which had become of late years a credit and an ornament to the City.

Messrs. Herbert Haszard, Arthur Newberry and a member of the City Council to be by that body selected were then appointed a Committee of Management. Meeting adjourned.
