PARIS, August 17.—The newest form of confidence trick was played at the Opera, when the other night a beautiful Parisian woman was robbed of one of the finest pairs of diamond earrings in the world.

The woman was sitting alone in a box. Just as the performance commenced a famous Maharajah, wearing a pink silk turban, and loaded with jewels, entered the adjoining box with his suite, and as he sat down threw an admiring glance at the handsome woman around him.

At the first lull in the show a man in an officer's uniform entered the Parisienne's box. "I owe you a thousand pardons, madame," he whispered. "I am the aide-de-camp of the Maharajah in the next box, and he has been fascinated by your magnificent earrings."

"He thought he had the finest diamond earrings in the world, but he finds he is mistaken, and he begs to know if you will not permit him to examine one of yours."

With a thrill of pride the woman handed over one of her diamonds, but when she failed to see him enter the Maharajah's box she became worried and went into the corridor to look for an official. A brisk sort of man in evening clothes stepped up as she left her box.

"I am the commissar of police for the Opera, madame," he whispered. "I fear that a clever thief has stolen your diamond earrings."

"Didn't a man dressed as an officer come and tell you that the Maharajah wanted to see it? He has worked the same trick on several women here, and we are on his track. I must ask you to let me have your other earring, so that we can identify yours when we find it."

The silly woman handed over the second diamond, and she has never seen the bogus officer, the false commissar, or her diamonds since.

All police investigations have been in vain, as the trick was played by one of the cleverest bands of international thieves in the world.

Pawnbroker's One Ambition

(By British United Press.) BERLIN, August 17.—An ambitious pawnbroker in search of social distinction told his pathetic story to a local court recently.

He had, he said, in the course of the last ten years succeeded in amassing a considerable fortune. All he needed to make him perfectly happy was some official or diplomatic title.

A Berlin acquaintance, Dr. Bramert, who claimed to have influential friends in the Angora Cabinet, offered to procure for him the post of Turkish Consul-General in Berlin.

He told Herr Hamburger that Angora demanded that \$250 should be paid in advance to defray the official stamp duty usual in connection with certain credentials. The money was handed over to Dr. Bramert, and before long news came that the appointment had been made.

Herr Hamburger gave a magnificent banquet at one of Berlin's most fashionable hotels, and invited various industrial and commercial magnates to celebrate his accession to consular honors.

Weeks passed, however, and nothing further was heard of the promised appointment. Finally Hamburger decided to sue the doctor for obtaining money under false pretences.

Dr. Bramert suavely assured the court that the \$250 had actually been sent to the Grand Vizier, Djavid Bey, who, however, had unfortunately been condemned to death and executed before he had time to put his signature to the appointment. The pawnbroker's counsel was unable to disprove this statement, and Dr. Bramert was acquitted.

Fire Fatal To Five Is Blamed On Vat

MONTREAL, Aug. 16.—Investigators probing the cause of the explosion and fire which wrecked three tenements at 749, 751, 753 Seigneurs street early this morning killing five persons and injuring six, expressed the opinion tonight that the blaze might have been due to the presence of a vat of some nature in the premises at 749, supposedly unoccupied at the time of the break.

Owing to the fact that it was too dangerous to enter the wrecked building, which housed the three tenements, detectives and fire underwriters' representatives were unable to make a full examination of the debris in an effort to discover material which would confirm their suspicions.

STEEL ISLAND FOR MID-OCEAN IS PLANNED FOR NEAR FUTURE

OSLO, Aug. 17.—Prof. William Hovgaard, prominent American maritime expert, has arrived in Copenhagen, and in giving the details of a scheme for floating an artificial island in mid-Atlantic to afford landing places for regular trans-Atlantic air routes, he declared the project has been submitted to United States government authorities and that its realization is expected in the near future.

According to the plan, a steel island, 1,050 feet long and the same width as the steamship Leviathan, would be anchored on the Faraday banks, situated 760 miles from Ireland, and 1,050 from Newfoundland. On the island a personnel of 200 would be stationed, including reserve aviators, doctors, nurses, and a further reserve of flying machines, spare parts, fuel, etc.

THE PORT OF IMPROVEMENTS

Q. What improvements are planned for the Port of Montreal?

A. An additional expenditure of \$12,000,000 has been approved by the Montreal harbor Commission and the Federal Government, including a 3 million-bushel addition to elevator No. 3 (to cost \$1,800,000). This will bring the total harbor grain capacity to over 15,000,000 bushels. With the present unloading machinery in elevator No. 3, 28 cars per hour can be unloaded. Harbor grain conveyors can load 5 vessels at the same time at the rate of 120,000 bushels per hour. New piers and more berthing space will also be provided.
