..A FINE CHURCH.—The Roman Catholic brick church at Head St. Peter's Bay is undoubtedly one of the finest church buildings in the province. Situated on rising ground, on the North side of the Bay, it commands an extensive view of the surrounding country, and can be seen from a great distance. This church was begun in 1881 by the late Bishop McIntyre, the corner stone being laid on the 23rd of August in that year. The brick of which the church is built, was manufactured in the parish from native material, at Southampton on the St. Peter's Road, a short distance from the village. The architect was Mr. Raymond, of Quebec. The interior of the church was completed by the late Rev. R. J. Gillis, who was for twenty years pastor of St. Peter's. The altar and interior decorations of this church are perhaps the finest in the province. Bishop McIntyre, who was a native of the parish, being born at Cable Head, is buried under the sanctuary, where the remains of Father Gillis, so long pastor of this church, also repose. The grounds surrounding the church are a marvel of beauty and neatness and needless to say, are always kept in perfect order. The Catholic congregation of St. Peter's are justly proud of their church which notwithstanding the cost, which must have been very considerable, is entirely free of debt. The present pastor is Reverend Alexander McLaughlin, who is also a native of St. Peter's.—E.

taken prisoners by the British in the recent Messines "push," were believed to have represented the attitude of the peasant classes when they asserted that they did not even know the United States had entered the war. They were each 20 years of age and had been called to the colors a year ago much against their will, they said. They had received nine months' training prior to being sent to the front. The remarkable training of the Germans is shown in the discipline maintained at the Dorchester camp. Although more than 20,000 prisoners have been interned there since the war started, only two have attempted to escape. Almost without exception the Germans say they are contented with their surroundings and are well treated.

Prisoners are Well Fed

The prisoners did their own washing and cooking. Their rations consist of thirteen ounces of bread daily, three-quarters of an ounce of coffee daily, one ounce of sugar daily, two ounces of turnips daily, two ounces of beans or peas daily, two ounces of oatmeal daily, one ounce of jam daily, two ounces of cheese daily, four ounces of rice daily and meal, pepper and salt. There is a slight reduction of bread, cheese, and meal in the ration of those who do not work. Except for their confinement, the German war prisoners are not much differently situated than any ordinary party of campers. Perhaps the one thing which impresses an American most is the spirit of sympathy which seems to exist between the British officials and their German charges and is shown not so much in their military salutations as by the care the one has taken not to contribute any more than is necessary to the discomfort of the other, while the prisoner himself smilingly accepts his lot as one infinitely better than that of his former comrades in arms.

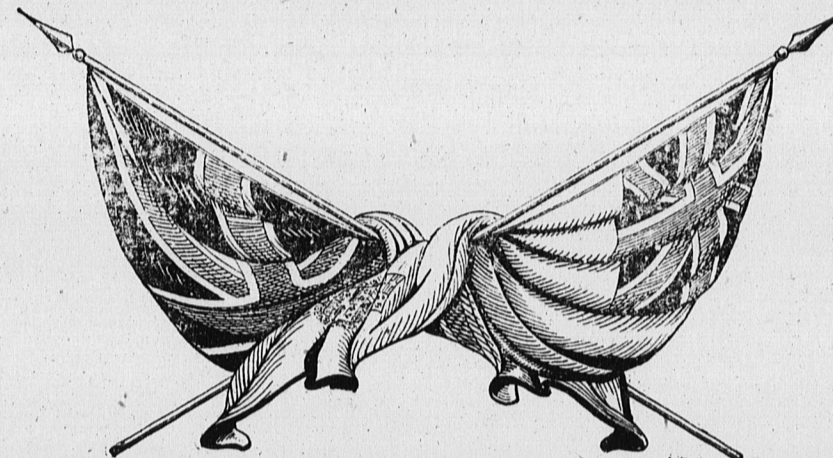
MR. HUGHIE CAMPBELL
