## Scientific Facts

**NEWEST NOTES OF SCIENCE.**

A magnetic crane small enough to be used inside a freight car has been designed.

Within a year 20 companies have been formed in China to produce motion pictures.

Accurate measurement of the efficiency of automobile brakes is made with a new meter.

Two thirds of the residents of Hungary are engaged in or dependent upon agriculture.

The handles of new ice tongs are so formed that a man can operate them with one hand.

France's coal production reached a record figure of 52,478,000 metric tons last year.

A latch key for a residence door forms part of a recently designed two bladed pocket knife.

In an endeavor to increase its cotton production Paraguay has established an experiment station.

Operating by a touch, a panel for automobile doors has been invented to facilitate hand signalling.

The Austrian government this year will grant its first subsidies for the development of air traffic.

Regular routes covered by motor-buses in the United States now exceed the total mileage of the railroads.

About 80 per cent of the inhabitants of England and Wales live in 11 per cent of the area of those countries.

Lack of noise and safeguards against overheating feature a new electric water heating device to be connected to a household supply.

To enable them to sink a shaft to coal deposits Belgian engineers froze the soft earth in a swamp about them with a salt solution.

Operated by clockwork when a spring is wound, a device has been invented to stir the contents of cooking utensils without attention.

Airplanes will be used by a government commission to conduct an inquiry into navigation on the Hudson bay and strait the coming summer.

Intended for use on shipboard or on trains or automobiles, a new holding holder for drinking glasses grips them firmly in a rubber ring.

A Russian scientist claims to have stimulated the development of seeds, bulbs and tubers by exposing them to X-rays for limited periods.

The movement of a ball of mercury in a tube to close electric contact wires operates a new rear light for automobiles automatically.

The total output of British coal mines last year amounted to about 125,500,000 long tons, approximately one half of the 1925 production.

Using an ordinary electric lamp, a projector has been designed to enable salesmen to show pictures of their goods to prospective customers.

Only half an inch thick, a wall board made of a combination of minerals has been patented that resists fire and sudden temperature changes.

Experiments are under way in Great Britain with the manufacture of artificial pearls from a substance obtained from Scotch herring scales.

Two passenger steamships plying between New York and California ports have been equipped with decks upon which children can play in safety.

Blight free banana trees have been developed and rubber obtained from imported trees by government experimenters in the Panama Canal Zone.

According to a government estimate 30,000 acres of trees are needed every year to supply the wood made into toothpicks in the United States.

Extensive introduction of machinery has greatly increased the production of lignite in Germany, most of the mining now being done above ground.

A New York state woman has invented a device with which a person can make accurate measurements of various parts of his anatomy without assistance.

Japan has electrified about 156 miles of its 8300 miles of main railway lines and plans have been made for changing the power on an additional 337 miles.

A device has been invented that registers on a strip of paper irregularities in the motions of machinery in time for their causes to be remedied promptly.

Apparatus invented in England to strengthen the fingers of musicians exercises them while held in the position in which they are used to play instruments.

For small automobiles a mounting for headlights has been devised by which they can be tilted downward by a driver pressing a pedal when other cars are met.

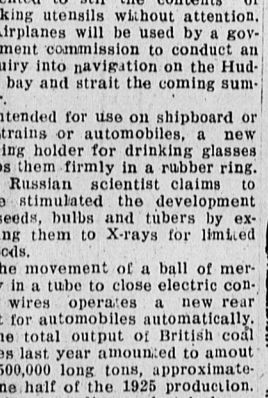
