IMMIGRATION RESTRICTIONS POSTPONED

Conference on Immigration Controversy Has Beneficial Result.

(Special to the Guardian)
WASHINGTON, D. C., May 12.—Prospects of an amicable settlement of the immigration controversy between Canada and the U. S. A. were regarded as good today when Vincent Massey, Canadian Minister, Commissioner of Immigration Joliffe of Ottawa and Hume Brown of the legation staff, conferred with Secretary of State Kellogg and Assistant Secretary of State Willbur Carr who has charge of immigration questions and Carl Robt White, Assistant Secretary of Labor in charge of immigration bureau.

It was understood that the American officials desired the Canadian officials to lay their complete story before them with a view to meeting the Canadian objection to compelling native Canadians and naturalized Canadians to pay head tax and visa fee when crossing the border to engage in labor in American plants.

No prompt settlement of the matter is expected as the question may probably have to be the subject of campaign at the coming session of Congress. Today's conference however was for the purpose of postponing the enforcement of the American regulation until Canada who are employed in the United States and we are hoping that the whole matter will be amicably settled at a conference in the near future," declared Hon. Robt. Forke, Minister of Immigration, in connection with news despatches intimating that the Department of Immigration has decided to investigate the number of Americans employed in this country as a means of retaliation against the United States measure.

Senate Kills Capital Punishment Bill

LANSING, Mich., May 12.—The capital punishment bill was definitely killed today when the Senate by a vote of 20 to 10, refused to concur on a conference report on the death penalty bill. The House earlier in the day voted 45 to 24 in favor of concurrence. The appointment of a new conference committee further to consider the bill is possible, but it is not looked on as probable.

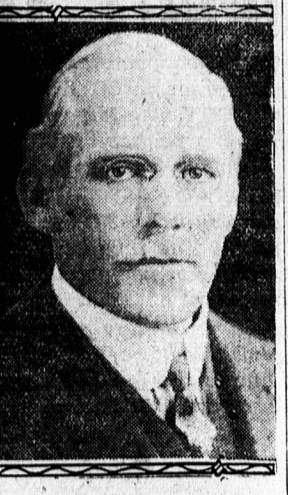

Ruth Snyder and Judd Gray to be Sentenced Friday

NEW YORK, May 12.—Friday the 13th of May will be a sad day for Mrs. Ruth Brown Snyder and her corset salesman paramour, Henry Judd Gray. On that day they will be sentenced to the electric chair for murdering Mrs. Snyder's husband with a sashweight and other things. Sentence was to have been pronounced on Monday next. The authorities gave no reason for advancing the date. Pronouncement of sentence will make little difference to the prisoners, who will be removed from two five-by-nine cells in the Queens County Jail to similar cells in Sing Sing penitentiary.

Northland Clubs to Operate in Lake Manouan District

DALLAS, Texas, May 12.—Five men and a woman were killed, more than 40 persons injured in an explosion that wrecked a two-story brick building here last night.

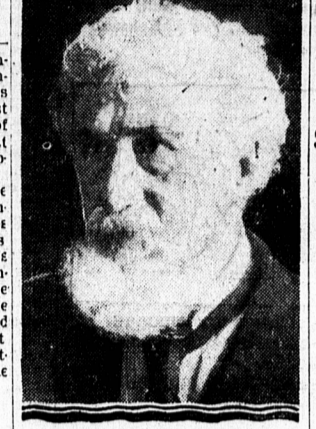
Police Raid Soviet Headquarters

Hudson Maxim, inventor of more deadly explosives than any other man of his time, who died on Saturday at his home, at Lake Hopatcong, N. J., at the age of sixty-four. His death, due to anemia, ended his experiments to make naval torpedoes more destructive. A foe for the pacifist to the end he contended that the country was poorly equipped for the impending test of battles, in which he believed it would be involved.

Death of Admiral Lord Kerr

DERBY, England, May 12.—Lord Kerr, Admiral of the Fleet, is dead, aged 88. Born in 1839, Walter Talbot Kerr entered the navy at the age of fourteen. After 51 years of distinguished service during which time he served at the battle of Lucknow in the Mediterranean, commanded the channel squadron and was private secretary of the first lord of the Admiralty, he was named admiral of the Fleet in 1904.

True Bill Against Proprietor Laurier Palace Theatre

MONTREAL, May 12.—True bills were returned in the case of Ameen Lawand, proprietor of the Laurier Palace Theatre where 78 children lost their lives in a fire panic last winter, and Michael Aris and Camil Bazzio two of Lawand's employees, by the grand jury in the court of King's bench today. The indictments charged manslaughter.

De Pinedo Resumes Air Voyage

PHILADELPHIA, May 12.—Commander Francesco De Pinedo, Italian flier, resumed his four continent air voyage at 7.25 a. m. today, when he lifted his giant seaplane from the surface of the Delaware river and started for Charleston S. C.

CANADA BUYING MORE GOODS FROM U. S. A.

\$61,000,000 Decrease in Exports of Canadian Products Abroad — Imports Increased \$103,000,000.

OTTAWA, May 12.—Canada's total trade increased approximately \$43,000,000 during the twelve months of the fiscal year ending March 31st, according to a statement issued today by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. Total trade for the twelve months was \$2,288,465,647 as compared with \$2,266,028,869 for the previous twelve months ending March 31, 1926.
