TO STAMP OUT THE DREAD TUBERCULOSIS.

Dr. Latham's statement of our knowledge of the disease is lucid, "non-technical," and yet full of remarks—at times a trifle cynical—which drive home the moral that stamping out of consumption is the problem in economics. "It is often said that poverty produces consumption. It is equally true that consumption produces poverty," and, again: "Drink is regarded, by many as a potent factor in the incidence of disease, but it is also true that many take drink because they have contracted consumption."

TWO PRINCIPAL METHODS.

Two principal methods by means of which tubercle bacilli may be disseminated are stated to be, first, milk and butter, and, second, the expectoration or discharges of consumptives. The purification of milk is dismissed in a few words, seeing that it has been shown that these "bacilli

which destroy the human race may themselves be destroyed by pasteurizing the milk for twenty minutes at 140 degrees Fahrenheit. This is a cheaper method than endeavoring to destroy all the tuberculous cattle, said in the same way, it is cheaper to prevent consumption or fight it in its early stages, than to provide for those who are past curing. "Enormous stress is laid on the necessity for early detection of the disease. "A pin prick," say the authors, "is more easily healed and less dangerous than a sword cut. An early lesion in the lungs may, in probably 80 per cent. or more cases, be permanently healed by prompt and adequate treatment."

Why, then, are people allowed to die in this manner? First, because of the difficulties of early diagnosis, and, second, because of the cost of adequate treatment—again the cost! Sanatorium treatment is described and its efficacy explained. The number of sanatoria in existence in the year 1908, according to the list published by the National Association for the Prevention of Consumption, was 96, providing accommodation for 1081. Most of these are expensive certainly out of the reach of the working-class patient.

COST IN MONEY.

Working-class organization is evidently, according to the authors, one of the chief things necessary. Statistics are given of the great wealth deposited with the friendly societies and savings banks, amounting to something like 426 millions sterling, all accumulated by the thrift of the workers. Yet how much is wasted? What is the cost of money? What is the loss due to consumption? The authors make a careful investigation of what is paid by friendly societies, poor law institutions, and charitable institutions, and of the indirect expenditure due to loss of wages and of life-capital.

The conclusion reached is that "the exact figures for the cost to the nation of tuberculous are not available. We have to rely on exact figures, but our estimate certainly understates the total cost to the country. The direct loss cannot be less than £2,973,516, whilst the direct and indirect cannot be less than £7,755,416." It should be noticed that this estimate is not worked out for the whole of the United Kingdom. The figures apply merely to England and Wales. How much of this wealth could be saved by an efficient campaign? The authors work out a scheme which is presented in tabular form.

COST OF SANATORIA.

Under capital expenditures comes

the cost of sanatoria throughout the kingdom, capable in the aggregate of accommodating 30,000 patients, and the purchase of the necessary land. In an appendix this matter is fully discussed by A. W. West, who is not only a distinguished architect, but has been for many years honorary treasurer to one of the great London hospitals. He shows that expensive sanatoria are no longer required, and describes the system used in erecting the building at Windsor, and concludes: "It is safe to say that a sanatorium possessing all the necessary requirements can be built for £100 a bed, or possibly less." This does not include the cost of the land, so that to the three million pounds required for actual building, the authors add £375,000 for sites, thus making a total capital outlay of £3,375,000.

AN EFFICIENT CAMPAIGN.

To understand the current expenditure account a knowledge of the scheme set forth in the book is necessary. State intervention would of course, be required. Dr. Latham shows that if every case of pulmonary consumption could be diagnosed in its early stages, and notified to the medical officer of health, six months or even four months, in a sanatorium at the expense of the States would probably stamp out the disease. The first item of expenditure would be the maintenance of special dispensaries, where specially qualified experts would be available to conduct the early diagnosis. The authors add £375,000 for sites, thus making a total capital outlay of £3,375,000.

CONQUEST OF CONSUMPTION.

"Tuberculosis exists in many forms. In all its forms—consumption, bone disease, glandular disease, peritonitis, etc.—it is a direct product of civilization. The disease does not exist in uncivilized countries, until it is introduced, as it always is in the train of civilizing influences." These are the first two sentences in a book published last week which has for its title, "The Conquest of Consumption," and for its authors Dr. Arthur Latham and C. H. Garland. The incisive method of the first sentence is typical of the whole book. Few authors are better qualified to deal with the question of consumption than is Dr. Latham; but he deliberately leaves the purely medical point of view, and with Mr Garland's assistance, shows how the "white scourge" affects the economy of civilized life. Indeed, the subtitle, "An Economic Study," is perhaps the better description of the whole book.

COST IN LIFE.

Its first chapter, "The cost in life," tells us that 40,000 deaths occur from pulmonary consumption alone each year in this country. "The greatest mortality is between 35 and 40 years of age—that is, at an age when a man is at his prime, and when he

has others dependent upon him for their livelihood—we begin to realize what a drain even this one form of tuberculosis is upon the national resources."

This drain on the national resources is the thing which is to be conquered, and the suggestion made by the authors as to the method of fighting the battle, are driven home by the facts and figures which, although fairly easily obtainable, have never been brought together in such a fashion as this. Here is a keynote to the chapters which follow: "The time is, therefore, ripe for a short, non-technical statement of our knowledge of the cause, detection, cure and prevention of the disease. To this we add a few facts of the more or less half-hearted efforts which are being made to cope with the disease at the present time. And in addition, we state, as far as we can ascertain, the cost to the country of these efforts, together with the cost of the disease, in loss of life and wages."

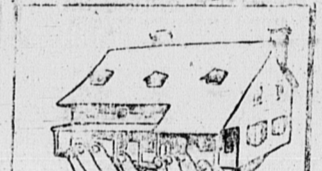
