NEW MUSSEL MUD SUPPLY.  
Through the enterprise of the  
McKinnon Co. of Montague, mus-  
sel mud is at the disposal of farm-  
ers in the Eastern part of the  
Province, this company having  
erected a mussel mud dredge in  
Sturgeon Bay where they are  
landing loads of mussel mud and  
delivering same at Montague. This  
mussel mud is considered by ex-  
perts as being the very best qual-  
ity of good pulverized old shells,  
the company having located an old  
oyster bed that has never been  
previously operated owing to the  
place not having frozen over in  
winter. The dredge, which the  
company has provided is a self  
loading and self-discharging one,  
carrying from eight to ten car  
loads. Farmers in the Eastern end  
of the Island have provided for  
them an excellent opportunity of  
securing the cheapest and best  
fertilizer that can be produced,  
landed on the nearest wharf, or  
loaded on cars at \$12 per car, if  
the railway will provide the facil-  
ities.

DEATH OF MR. JOSEPH  
LANE.—In the death of Mr. Joseph  
Lane of this city who passed  
away in the P. E. Island Hospital  
on Sunday morning after a pro-  
longed illness a well known citizen  
has been called away. Mr. Lane  
was employed for over fifty years  
in Duchemin's woodworking es-  
tablishment, having first served  
his apprenticeship with the grand-  
father of the present Duchemin  
brothers and later becoming fore-  
man in which capacity he served  
faithfully for many years. He re-  
tired from active work about a  
year ago, owing to failing health.  
Mr. Lane was well-known in boat-  
ing circles in earlier life when  
that pastime was the principal  
sport in Charlottetown and he was  
a most enthusiastic lover of sail-  
ing crafts. He was a prime favor-  
ite with the boys of his day and  
will be long remembered for his  
cheerful disposition. He leaves to  
mourn a widow, formerly Miss  
Mary J. Evans of this city, who  
will have the sympathy of many  
friends in her sad loss. The fune-  
ral takes place at 9 o'clock from  
his late home Prince Street, to St.  
Dunstan's Cathedral, thence to R.  
C. Cemetery. The factory of Mes-  
srs. A. Duchemin & Co., will be  
closed during the time of the  
funeral out of respect to the  
memory of deceased, who was not  
an employee but a life-long  
friend of the proprietors.

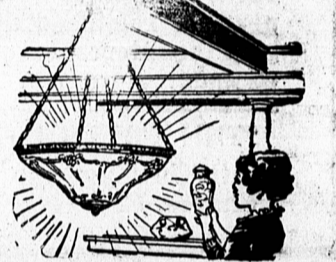

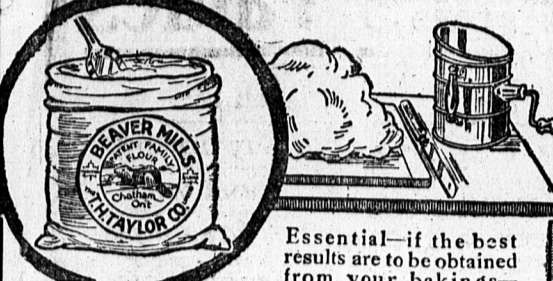
