SPECIAL RATES TO CONGRESS.

Canadian Pacific Railway Makes One-Way Fare in Canada for Round Trip to Dry Farming Meeting at Lethbridge.

LETHBRIDGE, Alberta, Feb. 29.—A special passenger tariff concession has been made by the Canadian Pacific Railway for the Seventh International Dry Farming Congress at Lethbridge, Alberta, Oct. 21-26, of a single fare from all points on its lines in Canada for a round trip ticket.

C. E. E. Usher, passenger traffic manager, has telegraphed E. A. Cunningham, vice-chairman of the Board of Control and President of the Board of Trade, who has been negotiating with the railroads for low transportation, that the C. P. R. will make the lowest convention rate known, namely one fare for going and returning, upon the certificate plan.

The rates heretofore granted conventions held in the Northwest and West have been one and one-quarter or one and one-half fare for a round trip, and this reduction to a single fare from all points in Canada may be followed by the transcontinental roads in the United States, assuring a very large attendance at the Congress and Exposition here next October.

Dates of sales of tickets and other details will be announced later on by the Canadian Pacific, and it is anticipated that the American roads will shortly make known their rates.

MURDER TRIALS IN MONTREAL.

MONTREAL, March 2.—The Grand Jury yesterday found true bills for murder against four men in charge; viz. Ross, accused of murdering Bob Fitzsimmons at a game of cards in Orpheum theatre, John Cummings, who shot his wife on the street, and two Italians. No bill was found against Dr. Ernest Laurie, who is charged with manslaughter and attempting to perform an illegal operation, following the ante mortem statement of the girl, Emily Thomassen, who died in Western Hospital here. Cummings pleaded insanity.

A HINDOO SACRIFICE AT THE EDEN MUSEUM.

The Eden Museum of New York City, has an underground chamber, called "The Chamber of Horrors." It has many special alcoves and rooms in which are shown methods of punishment of various ages. One of the most interesting, shows the Hindoo Suttee, or a practice that was in vogue in India, until about the time the English took possession. By this custom, when a man died, his body was burned on a funeral pyre, together with his widow. The photograph shows the widow standing before the flaming fagots, and by ingenious mechanical devices, the figure strives to break away from the approaching fire. Other methods of punishment of olden times are equally interesting. Many new figures and groups have been added to the Museum's wonderful collection. The group of People Talked About, has almost daily additions. As soon as an individual becomes prominent in the public eye, his wax representation is placed in this group. Many new moving pictures has been secured from abroad and are shown hourly afternoon and evening in the large Winter Garden. Nearly all of these pictures are the exclusive property of the Museum and in no other amusement institution are so many pictures shown of the highest quality. Afternoon and evening concerts will be continued during the week with choice programs.

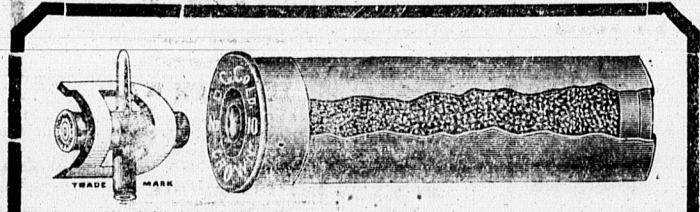
