

COAL HAS ADVANCED.

Ottawa Now One of the D. a est Cities in America for Coal.

OTTAWA, Sept. 27.—"All coal in Ottawa has been sold and the price has been pulled up to \$7.50 per ton."

This was the announcement made to the press yesterday by leading coal dealers. The price was advanced 50 cents yesterday, making a total advance of \$1 per ton since the strike, in anticipation of a further increase in the wholesale rates.

The city dealers state that in increasing the price of coal they are acting on the same lines as dealers in New York, Montreal and Toronto, who are closely in touch with the centers.

Customers who have booked their orders are being asked to take small quantities so that those who are not so fortunate may not be left without any. The dealers also advise householders to wait a while in the hope that the strike will soon be settled.

LORD'S DAY ALLIANCE.

Convention Will Commence on Nov. 9.—Meeting of the Executive Board.

TORONTO, Sept. 27.—The Executive Board of the Ontario Lord's Day Alliance met yesterday. Gratification was expressed over the fact that the Canadian exhibit at the Paris Exposition was kept closed on the Lord's Day. The Finance Committee urges every branch to put forth active efforts to secure funds.

Rev. J. G. Shearer spoke of his visit to the Maritime Provinces, and he said the sentiment of the people was strong concerning the proper observance of the Lord's Day.

The board put on record its deep regret at the removal by death of Miss Shearer, who for two years was assistant secretary in the office.

The board denounced the attempt of the Bruce Copper Mines Co. of Algoma to make their miners work on Sunday. Heroic steps will be taken to secure a better enforcement of the liquor law in Ontario.

J. C. Copp has consented to act as treasurer until the annual convention, which opens Nov. 9.

THE BEE AS A MESSENGER.

Donzens of Apairies is Substitutes for Postmen.

Says the Westminster Gazette: A west country farmer is training bees as letter carriers. A bee is taken away from home and a letter printed in microphotography is gummed to his little back, and he is thrown into the air. Home he goes like a carrier pigeon, and the advantage he would have over his big brother in time of war is obvious. It is very unlikely that he would be seen; and, if seen, it would tax the skill even of the finest Boer marksmen to bring him down. This is an idea worthy of the attention of the war office.

SAVED THE CANADIANS ANNIHILATION.

MONTREAL, Sept. 27.—A most interesting story regarding the Royal Canadian Regiment of infantry which has not before been mentioned was told a reporter by one of the invalided Canadian soldiers just returned. The story is to the effect that Col. N. Otter prevented the Canadian from participating in the fight at Magersfontein in which Gen. Wauchope was killed and the Highland troops almost annihilated. By so doing he undoubtedly saved the Canadian regiment from a fate very possibly of which sends a thrill through the heart of Briton on this continent. During the day preceding the fight, it appears, Lord Methuen ordered Col. Otter to take his regiment in to camp for the purpose of assisting General Wauchope and the Highland Brigade in attempting to scale the Boer position. Col. Otter begged Methuen to cancel the order for the reason that his men had but just reached the field, and had never been working together. He said he would prefer to ascertain what they were capable of doing before ordering them into such an important action. Then again, they were entirely unaccustomed to field tactics and would have to be coached in these before they could safely take part in any of the engagements. On the strength of these representations Methuen cancelled the order and the Royal Canadian Regiment was probably saved from a fate horrible to contemplate. The informant said that Col. Otter, although subject to criticism for many things he did, could not but be praised for the stand he took, thus saving the Canadians for proper training and finally for Paardeberg.

Unoubtedly, had the order been obeyed, the Canadians would have been mowed down with Gen. Wauchope and the gallant Highland Brigade.

WARLIKE INDICATIONS.

Rush of German Officers For Life Insurance Sets Rumors Afloat.

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—That the officers and men in the German army are firm in the belief that war is imminent between Germany and China is reflected in the unusual number of applications which have been made to a life insurance company in this city for policies on their lives. Hundreds of applications have been received through a Berlin agency. Information which came from Berlin was of such a character that the declaration of war was believed to be close at hand. With each application there was a request that it should be issued at once and the risk be made binding.

ROCKEFELLER BEATS CORRIGAN.

A Suit Involving a Million Dollars Decided in Favor of Standard Oil Magnate.

CLEVELAND, Sept. 28.—Judge Lamson of the Common Pleas Court has handed down a decision in favor of John D. Rockefeller in the million-dollar suit brought against Mr. Rockefeller by Captain James Corrigan.

In 1895 Corrigan placed 2,500 Standard Oil certificates in Rockefeller's hands to secure a loan. Rockefeller held the stock as trustee, and finally purchased it himself, placing the value at 157 a share. Corrigan afterward charged him with committing fraud.

He alleged that Rockefeller by reason of his position as trustee had superior knowledge of the value of the stock and that the stock was worth 450 instead of 137 per share. The matter was submitted to arbitrators, who decided in favor of Rockefeller. Corrigan refused to accept their findings and took the case into court.

FRENCH FAJIS FOR GERMANS.

BERLIN, September 28.—The firm of Hohner & Co., in Trossinger, Wuttenberg has sent six thousand French harps to the German troops in China. The instrument bears Prince Bismark's motto, "We Germans fear God and nothing else in the world."

BRESCI HAS A DAUGHTER.

The Wife of the Assassin of King Humbert of Italy is Still Living in Hoboken.

NEW YORK, Sept. 28.—A daughter has been born to Mrs. Gaetano Freschi, wife of the assassin of King Humbert. The event occurred Saturday night in the home at No. 363 Clinton-avenue, West Hoboken, in which Bresci had installed his wife before leaving for Italy on his fatal mission, but it was not made known, even to the neighbors, until yesterday. The infant is healthy and the mother is doing well.

Mrs. Bresci has not written to her husband to tell him of the event. She does not believe the letter would reach him if she did, and fears that he will never even know of the daughter whose face he can never see.
