British Columbia papers contain the following details of the death of Roy Mason, son of the late Oliver Mason, formerly of Southport, P. E. I.

NEW WESTMINSTER, Oct. 21.—Roy Mason, 45, of 4049 School street, Sapperton, met instant death at 6 p. m. Saturday when his automobile was struck by a Central Park interurban tram at Sixth Avenue and Eighteenth street.

Mason's body was discovered about 100 feet from the intersection. He had suffered a deep gash in the head and numerous other injuries.

apparent impairment of capital. This had been effected, Mr. Jenkins believed, largely at the expense of the Canadian and United States buyers, as one company alone enjoyed practically a 90 percent single control market.
