MEXICO CITY, Sept. 18.—The death toll from Friday's tropical hurricane mounted tonight to 135 as swollen streams receded and troops recovered 45 more bodies in San Luis Potosi and 21 in Tampico.

TRADES AND LABOR FAVOR CENTRAL BANK

Trades And Labor Congress Forwards Brief to Lord MacMillan.

OTTAWA, Sept. 18.—(C.P.)—The Trades and Labor Congress of Canada supports the principle of nationalization of the banking system. In a submission to the Royal Commission on Banking, which bears the signatures of Tom Moore, President, and P. M. Draper, Secretary, the Congress declares in favor of the establishment of a Central Bank as a forward step toward nationalization.

To Discuss Resumption Of World Parley

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18.—Secretary of State Cordell Hull indicated today the United States would be represented at any meeting abroad to discuss general plans for the resumption of the World Economic Conference and said that in the meantime conversations on disarmament would be continued unabated.

Probe Burning Of Reichstag

LONDON, Sept. 18.—The International Legal Committee inquiring into last winter's burning of the German Reichstag announced tonight its findings would be published Wednesday, the day before five persons accused by the Nazi Government go on trial in Leipzig.

Canada Facing Future With Calm Confidence

OTTAWA, Sept. 18.—Canada was facing her problems with a calm confidence born of a realization of the resources and possibilities of the country and of the ideals of service that actuated the pioneers of the Dominion, Prime Minister R. B. Bennett declared at a banquet tonight of the Canadian Gas Association in annual conference here.
