Mrs. John A. McKinnon, Lewis, Lot 60, has received the following letter from her son who is "Somewhere in France, 204571 A Co., 13th Bat. B. E. F., France, Dec. 3, 1916.

My dear mother: I am going to answer your welcome letter which I received yesterday and glad to hear from you and to hear that you were well as I can return the same.

I am in France now but we are not supposed to tell where we are. I saw Alex. McKinnon, Lewis, and he is well. I was talking to him awhile. I also saw some of the 105th Battalion who came over including Laughie McPhee, of Bellevue; Bruce McLeod

and Alex. Martin, from Grandview. The others are still in England. I saw lots of boys that I know and they are going to reinforce us, the 13th Battalion, the Blackwatch.

We are getting all kinds of socks here and they are very good to us. There is lots of rain so you may know we are having lots of mud. I must close this time with lots of love to all, as lights must go out. SAM.
