THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.

TUESDAY, April 28.

House met at 3.45. The House resumed committee of the whole on Supply. Hon Mr Rogers said it was generally conceded that the \$350 given to the Winter Fair was well spent. On the item for Administration of Justice Mr Mathieson protested again the increase in this grant. He asked the Leader of the Government whether it was the intention to till the country now whether the question concerning an item of Administration of Justice asked last year would be answered now. Hon Mr Peters did not say anything in reply and Mr Mathieson said the silence of the Premier would be construed by the Opposition as a refusal to answer the question.

Mr McKinnon urged that a resident magistrate be appointed in King's County. Hon Mr Peters said that when Mr Palmer resigned suddenly as Stipendiary in Queens County Mr Blanchard was appointed for both counties and the appointment of another Magistrate for King's County was now being considered. He said if Mr McKinnon had as much trouble about Mr Beers as he (Hon Mr Peters) had he would not say anything about it. Temperance people at first sustained Mr Beers and later condemned him. A strong petition had been sent in for another man and then another came supporting Mr Beers' retention in office. As far as the temperance interests are concerned in King's County the law is being carried out as well as any law. He also eulogized Mr Jenkins in Charlottetown for his good and fearless work in enforcing the law.

Mr McKinnon pointed out that a non resident Stipendiary could not do the work as well as a resident one. He thought Mr Beers would do fairly well with a resident Magistrate. He did not think the Scott Act was well enforced as fines were not collected.

Hon Mr Peters said those against whom fines were not collected had left the country or were imprisoned. Mr. Marson wanted to know why J. N. Campbell got \$500 for enforcing the Prohibitory Act when he did nothing in the work. He urged that the amount which Mr. Palmer got last year from the Government be stated.

Hon. Mr. Peters characterized in the strongest language the conduct of the Opposition in referring so frequently to the charges against Messrs. Palmer and Wheat. Mr. McLean denounced the Chairman for not calling the Committee on Public Accounts together and the Chairman, Capt. Read defended his position.

The details of last year leading up to the issuing of writs against Messrs. Wheat and Palmer and the question of calling together of the Public Accounts Committee were discussed at considerable length and warmly by Hon. Mr. Peters, Mr. Mathieson, Mr. McDonald, Mr. McLean, Mr. Marson and others and was still before the House when the Speaker took the chair at six o'clock.

THE DOGFISH PEST. OTTAWA April 26.—Prof. Prince, commissioner of Fisheries, has returned from a visit to the North Shore of New Brunswick, where in company with Mr Morris, of Northumberland County he took a tour along the coast investigating the dogfish pest. They think the Government cruisers should be employed for a time in the work of extermination.

EDITOR'S MAIL.

MR. CHIPMAN IS RIGHT.

SIR.—I notice in your issue of Saturday morning that Mr. Chipman complains that the railway is not extended along the city front and that if such is not done he must, to protect the interest of his steamers and owners consider the proposition of the Summerside merchants to have the S. S. Halifax and Olivette dock at the Railway Wharf, Summerside, till such time as the railway is extended to the wharves along our city front. We think that Mr. Chipman is perfectly right in insisting on this extension being made. Transferring heavy cargoes to and from the railway by teams is an expensive undertaking and reduces the earnings of the steamers by whatever the cost of transferring may be.

As the Board of Trade here and all our leading men have been agitating for this extension of the rails for a quarter of a century, it is now about time that the Government took the matter in hand without further delay. It is said that the Charlottetown Navigation Co., have been opposing the extension, but there is no truth we think in this as some of the leading shareholders in connection with that Company have been most earnest in urging the Government to proceed with this necessary work. In this connection it might be well to say that it is reported that the Navigation Co., is opposed to the Hotel Davies site for the Railway Station. Nothing we are satisfied could be further from the truth. The lumber operations carried on at the corner of Great George and Water Streets have been a source of annoyance for some time and the erection of the new station would remove what is practically a nuisance and at the same time greatly enhance the value of the companies' wharf by properties.
