In tomorrow's magazine section of The Guardian will appear the music and words of a popular song entitled "Aren't You the Girl?" This song is exceedingly catchy and made a decided hit in New York and other large American cities.

On and after May 1st, The Guardian will be sold at three cents each by the newsboys on the Prince Edward Island Railway. The above advance is due to the increase in the price of paper and the heavy expense connected with the publication of a morning newspaper.

At the annual meeting of the Charlottetown Lawn Tennis Club held in the Y. M. C. A. Parlors Tuesday, April 25th, the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: J. O. Hyndman, President (re-elected); H. E. Miller, Vice-President; A. H. C. Beattie, Secretary; Treasurer, Executive, G. T. Purdy, R. P. Fitzgerald, H. L. Palmer; Tea Committee, Misses Lois Taylor, Evie Hassard and Mabel Longworth.

Friends in this province heard of the death of Frank Killam, Yarmouth, with sincere regret. He was the third son of the late Hon. F. Killam at one time a member of the Nova Scotia Legislature and member for Yarmouth in the House of Commons from Confederation until his death in 1868. The deceased was born in 1843, was educated at Sackville, and in 1868 married Ellen daughter of Henry Wood, of Yarmouth. Mr. Killam was first elected to Ottawa on the death of his father and was re-elected at the general elections of 1872, 1874 and 1878. The late Mr. Killam is survived by his wife, three daughters. A son is prof. Laurence Killam, now at Sackville, and there are two other sons in Vancouver. Mr. Killam has been suffering for some time with heart trouble. He was a member of the shipping firm of Killam Bros. and was one of the best known and most popular men in Yarmouth.

In the U. S. Consular Trade report of recent date Consul Deemeyer, City, has an exhaustive report on the industries of P. E. Island. He begins by giving vital statistics, area, &c. Some interesting facts gleaned from the report are as follows. The value of the output of farm and animal products in 1910 was \$9,700,000. Fisheries gave employment to 5,322 persons. The yield of all the fisheries was about 15 below that of 1909. Of the 30 fishing vessels and 1,989 fishing boats, about 20 per cent were propelled by gasoline motors. Speaking of the probable result of the proposed reciprocal agreement, he says: Under this agreement P. E. Island will probably become a large exporter of agricultural and animal products to the United States. The value of farm products and those of the fisheries will increase 30 per cent, and the purchasing power of the people will grow correspondingly. American exporters will find an improved market here for their goods. It is suggested that those seeking this market can increase the sale of their products when once introduced by employing the methods of local advertising which they find profitable at home. Little of such advertising is done here now, while goods of Canadian and British make are constantly brought conspicuously before the public through every form of advertising. Samples without value are admitted free of duty. No tax is levied on commercial travellers from foreign countries. American exporters are urged to instruct their salesmen visiting Canadian Provinces to call upon the American consuls and consular agents, who will materially aid in their efforts to introduce their goods and extend the market for them.

Quite a large number of young men from this province have located in the great west and many more contemplate removing in the near future. Read what a N. B. boy who returned from the west has to say: Stanley E. Moore, who has been a resident of Cranbrook, B. C., for some time past, has returned to his home in Mechanic Settlement and will remain in the east. Mr. Moore is convinced that New Brunswick is good enough for him. The west is becoming more and more a country in which capital is required to make good. The "dead easy snap" days are over and those who have an idea that gold dollars are to be picked up in the streets should remain where they are. If a man without capital is prepared to go west and rough it, he will eventually win out but he will be forced to pick up with conditions that he would not tolerate in the east.

TRYING TO SHUT OUT THE AMERICAN NEGRO
WASHINGTON, April 27—The plans of Canada to adopt restrictive measures against the immigration into that country of American negroes were the subject of a Conference between Secretary Wilson and John Jones Consul-General at Winnipeg. Mr. Jones presented a memorandum from the Canadian Immigration authorities indicating that the American negro may be barred on the ground that he could not become adapted to the rigorous Northern climate and consequently might become a public charge.

WAITING FOR THE CENSUS
MONTREAL, April 23—The campaign on behalf of the Government's reciprocity measure was carried into Westmont, on Saturday evening, when about 500 people gathered in Victoria Hall to hear Hon. Sidney Fisher, Minister of Agriculture, and Hugh Guthrie, M.P. (South Wellington) take up the case for closer trade relations. One element of the attendance was in a heckling mood, of which the minister of agriculture was the chief victim. In answer to one question put to him as to why the Government did not put the question to the electors, Mr. Fisher replied: "Just as soon as you want it you shall have the chance, but we do not propose to disfranchise a great number of people, who after the census will have votes. We don't think that the present distribution represents fairly the whole country. It would be a national crime for the Government to dissolve and go to the country just in the face of a census and redistribution."

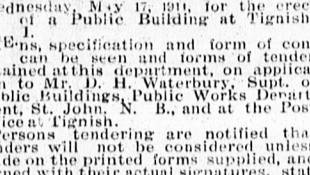
