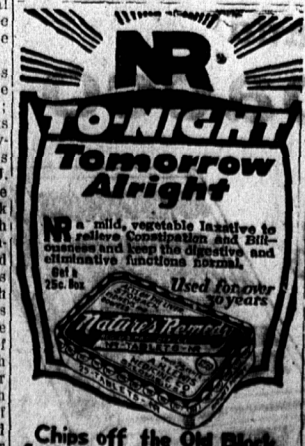

EGG LAYING CONTEST
Notes on the Prince Edward Island Egg Laying Contest, for the Thirty-Sixth Week of the Contest, Ending July 9, 1924
There was quite a little falling off during the thirty-sixth week of the Charlottetown Egg Laying Contest, due to the hot weather. The total number of eggs laid during the week was 817, the total to date 23,461.
The Experimental Station's pens Nos. 13 and 14 tied for first place for the week with 50 eggs each; Rev. A. Macdonald's Barred Rocks were second, with 49 eggs; Mr. Everett Howatt's White Leghorns were third, with 48 eggs; Mr. J. J. McGilivray's White Leghorns were fourth, with 47 eggs; Mrs. Frank Halliday's Barred Rocks tied with Mr. Howatt's White Leghorns. The Whites of Mrs. H. L. Machon's Barred Rocks and Mr. Samuel McPherson's White Leghorns for fifth place with 45 eggs each; Mr. Angueline's White Wyandottes tied with the Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 12 for sixth place with 42 eggs; Mr. J. Parker Hooper's Barred Rocks tied with the Experimental Station's pen of Leghorns No. 15 and Mr. Edward Bulpitt's White Leghorns for seventh place, with 40 eggs each.
The Experimental Station's pens of White Leghorns Nos. 14, 15 and 16, were first, second, third and fourth with 1499, 1498, 1470 and 1288 eggs respectively; Mr. Samuel McPherson's White Leghorns were fifth with 1264 eggs; Mr. Edward
