ACTION TAKEN TO SEND TROOPS

MARCONI WILL SUE GOVERNMENT

His Company Refuse Licenses Which Would Compel Exchange of Messages with Other Companies--The All Red Line Project.

OTTAWA, Aug. 6--The Marconi Telegraph Company have intimated to the government that they will take proceedings in the courts to enforce their claim that under their contract with the government they are not compelled to exchange messages with any other wireless company.

SYDNEY MAN IS DROWNED AT SEA

SYDNEY, N.S., Aug. 6--Patrick Cahill, a brakeman, employed at the Steel plant, was drowned at noon today by the overturning of a boat while off Anders Point, Victoria Park.

JAP DEFENDS GEN. STOESEL

PARIS, Aug. 7--Captain Tsunoda, the Japanese military attaché here, who while on the staff of General Nogai, conducted the negotiations for the surrender of Port Arthur, in an open letter today came out in defense of General Stoessel, the defender of the fortress, on the eve of the letters trial by court martial for surrender to the Japanese.

DEMANDS WERE SOON GRANTED

MONTREAL, Aug. 6--Some one hundred and fifty men employed by the Nova Scotia Steel Co. and the Inverness Coal Co. in unloading coal on the wharves, went on strike this afternoon, demanding 40 cents an hour instead of 37 cents. The demand was granted and the men will return to work in the morning.

MEMBERS SON KICKED BY HORSE

AMHERST, N.S., Aug. 5--Wallace, son of H. J. Logan, M.P., was kicked in the side by a horse yesterday afternoon and one of his ribs broken. He was rendered unconscious. Although the injury is very painful no serious results are anticipated.

RICH MAN DIES IN RAILWAY CAR

ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 6--Albert Littlefield, president of the Littlefield Manufacturing Company, of Pawtucket (R. I.) died suddenly on a train which arrived here from Sunnyside Lake this morning. James J. Fennegan who said he was a nurse and employed by Mr. Littlefield for several weeks, was detained at police headquarters here at the direction of Coroner Schupp. Fennegan had \$1,198 in his possession. The coroner ordered Fennegan held because of conflicting stories told by him relative to Mr. Littlefield's valuables. An investigation is being made.

WEDDED QUICK AND SORRY NOW

ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 6--Although only the bare details of the death of Albert Littlefield had reached the office of the Littlefield Manufacturing Company in this city tonight, it was stated however, that there were absolutely no suspicious circumstances in connection. He left Saratoga yesterday in charge of a nurse, on his way to his home here. He had been suffering for several years from tuberculosis and although his death was unexpected, it was said that undoubtedly it was due to his disease.

TUMBLING DOWN THE ELEVATOR

ST. JOHN, August 6--There was another accident yesterday afternoon in the Union Blend Tea warehouse on Dock street and as before at the elevator shaft. At the time of the accident some men were at work putting in some machinery and the elevator shaft was open and John Lenihan a young fellow about eighteen stumbled into it. Although not considered seriously hurt, he was taken to the hospital as his mother was away. Last night he was reported as resting comfortably.

A CHILL FOR CLANRICHADE

LONDON, Aug. 6--After an uninteresting debate, in which the leaders of the opposition indicated their intention of opposing the measure in committee, the second Irish tenancy bill passed its second reading in the house of lords today.

HAIL DAMAGED PRAIRIE CROPS

SINCLAIR, Man., August 6--The worst storm in the experience of the oldest settlers visited this neighborhood about 8 o'clock last evening. Thousands of acres of splendid crops were completely demolished. The belt is two miles wide and the length at present writing cannot be ascertained, but is not less than ten miles. The storm was accompanied by a high wind, and there is hardly a whole pane of glass in the track of the storm.

SYDNEY ELOPERS ARE RETURNED

ST. JOHN, August 7--Provincial Constable S. J. McDonald of Sydney took back to Sydney last night the two prisoners, Joseph Grenullo and Donaccetta Ventiesco, who are charged with stealing \$210 from Pulpito Ventiesco. These were the two Italians who with a child were arrested by officer Crawford on a telegram from Sydney.

MISSING BODIES NOT YET FOUND

MONTREAL, Aug. 6--No trace has yet been found of the three men and Shirley D. Wilson, who are supposed to have been drowned in the Y. V. steamer on Sunday last. The search parties were reinforced today by a tug from the harbor commission, but the many parties at work were forced to desist tonight with the mystery as obscure and baffling as ever. No new facts developed in the day.
