VITAL STATISTICS.—According to returns so far received by the Vital Statistics office, Provincial Department of Agriculture, there have been 436 marriages throughout the Province during the year, as against 557 (total returns) for 1922.

ENQUIRY AGAIN ADJOURNED.—The Commission appointed to enquire into the conduct of Andrew Fraser Mitchell met and adjourned twice yesterday. Adjournment was necessary owing to the non-appearance of Hon. John E. Sinclair, M. P. The Attorney General stated that on Dec. 17th he had spoken to Mr. Sinclair by telephone, informing him that the enquiry had been adjourned from time to time for his convenience and asking him what date would suit him to attend and give his evidence. It was arranged, and Mr. Sinclair agreed, to attend on Dec. 24th at 11 a.m. or as soon after as the western train arrived. The Commission accordingly met in the morning and again in the afternoon but Mr. Sinclair did not appear. Yesterday the sheriff's bailiff testified to having visited Mr. Sinclair's home at Emerald on Thursday for the purpose of serving a second subpoena and he was there informed that Mr. Sinclair had left for Ottawa on Wednesday. The date of his return was not known. The Commission adjourned sine die.

TO HONOR FALLEN 26th.—Decision to erect in some part of New Brunswick, a memorial to the fallen members of the 26th Battalion was made at the fourth annual dinner of former officers of the battalion held this week in the Byng Boy's bungalow, an officers' club, at Pleasant Point. A number of Island soldiers served in this distinguished battalion.

A COMMENDABLE ACT.—Yesterday afternoon the members of the Young-Adams Co., accompanied by Dr. Frank drove to Falconwood Hospital and entertained the patients to a most enjoyable variety show. On Monday afternoon this popular company are entertaining the children and sisters of St. Vincent's Orphanage, Mr. Young and his associates are to be commended for their many charitable acts during their engagement in this city, which is appreciated not only by the institutions visited but also by the citizens generally.

P. W. C. EXAMS.—At the Prince of Wales College, this year the Christmas examinations were written by the following number of students: 3rd year, seventeen students; 2nd year, 98 students; 1st year, 224 students. The attendance has been the largest in the history of the institution and it was necessary to make two divisions in the 2nd and 3rd years. The results of the 3rd and 2nd year exams are now being made up. In the 1st year class there were a few students falling below the required number of marks but this was due in part at least to the outbreak of measles which occurred just when the hardest work was in progress, and which kept a number of good students behind. On the whole however the returns so far are satisfactory. In the 1st year exams the following marks were given in the various studies: English, possible 300, highest marks made 271; Arithmetic, possible 200, highest 197; Penmanship, 75, highest, 65; Botany, possible, 100, highest, 94 1/2; Physiology, possible 100, highest 94 1/2; Phonetics, possible, 100, highest 80. Total possible marks, 775. Necessary marks to pass (65 per cent) 504. Highest aggregate made by any student, 658. When 1st year students fall below 65 per cent in the exams the parents are advised of the fact and a course of study at home until the following term is suggested. The faculty have now the authority to enforce this measure in the case of students falling below 60 per cent.
