Beavers Hand Hawks Crushing 11-3 Defeat

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Dec. 4.—Although Moncton Hawks remained in leadership of the Maritime Big Five hockey league, they suffered a crushing, 11-3 defeat tonight by Saint John Beavers who enjoyed a second period seven-goal spurge.

The win left Beavers still in third place below Truro Bearcats in the league standing.

The traditional rivalry, ended the first period 2-2 but Hawks were unable to count in the second while Beavers slammed home their big seven. Moncton scored once in a lighter third session but Beavers ended the count with two more.

Eddie Price starred with four goals and an assist. Butler and Federonick had a brace each and LeBlanc, Fitzgerald and Kyle shot the others for Beavers. Bell scored two of the Moncton goals, with Agnew getting the other.

The teams played on even terms in the first period with Hawks knotting the count each time after Beavers tallied.

Saint John's high-scoring defenceman, Walter Kyle, opened the count early and Agnew tied the midway through the session. Bell was assisted. Then Kyle scored again while Bastarache was serving time, and Bell made things equal once more as Kyle took a turn in the penalty box.

Beavers missed several close-in shots during the period. Moncton looked the services of their veteran star, Sammy McManus, as well as Leadbetter and Bucko Traylor. Saint John used Nick Kelly, who had been out of the city since he did not accomplish anything sensational.

When Beavers outplayed Hawks in the big second period, Price, Butler and Federonick each with a brace, opened several close-in shots for the other. The only unassisted tally of the seven was Federonick's first. Four Hawks incurred penalties during the session, with Fraser suffering two. That tally came in quick succession while Steele and Whitlock were doing time.

The visitors settled down in the last frame and Bell, helped by O'Toole, opened several close-in scoring. That ended the Hawks for the night as Price shot another assisted brace.

Four major penalties for fighting were imposed before the period ended. When Kyle and Fraser tangled, O'Toole and Demchuk also waded in. All received majors. Fraser also got a misconduct.

CHICAGO, Dec. 4.—Chicago Black Hawks and Detroit Red Wings played a lull 0-0 tie tonight in a National Hockey League game before 15,069 persons, smallest Chicago Stadium crowd of the season.

The cellar-dwelling Hawks offensively were at their ineffective worst as they salvaged the tie which came after three straight defeats. Detroit, unable to better the weak Chicago effort, remained in fourth place in the standings.

Only excitement of the contest was a third period fight between Johnny Marucci of Chicago and Jack Stewart of Detroit. The struggle broke out after Stewart's stick had opened a gash in Marucci's head. During a halt in play to patch Marucci, the two started swinging.

After each had a drawn a major and minor penalty, the two brawling defencemen again went to work on each other with their fists in the box. For this fight, each drew misconduct penalties and left the game.

BOSTON, Dec. 4.—(CP)—Boston Bruins went through their seventh National Hockey League tie in 17 starts by setting a 2-2 deadlock with the Toronto Maple Leafs in a rough and bruising exhibition that drew 14 penalties tonight at the Boston Garden.

There were lively fist fights in each of the three periods and Toronto's Howie Meeker and Garth Boesch drew major penalties, as did the Bruins' Murray Henderson, for starting the outbursts.

Each team scored during the first period and Harry Watson accounted for both of the Toronto tallies after being set up twice by Syl Apps.

Watson's first counter put the Leafs into a 1-1 tie late in the opener and his second goal gave his forces a 2-1 lead early in the second period. Apps launched that with a breakaway.

Little Kenny Smith notched the first Boston goal and Babe Pratt rifled in a 20-footer without assistance while each side was playing short-handed after Henderson tangled with Ted Kennedy when he was high-sticked.

The first of the three battles, which revolved about Meeker and Don Gallinger, rapidly developed into a free-for-all but the others were man-to-man clashes.

Truro Bearcats Skate To 7-3 Victory Over United Services Team

HALIFAX, Dec. 4.—(CP)—A rampaging Truro Bearcats team smothered Halifax United Services under a 7-3 score here tonight to keep the Services definitely in last spot of the Maritime Senior Big Five Hockey League and assure themselves of a secure second place.

The Bearcats snapped their four-game losing streak as they downed the tail-end squad and moved within two points of the league-leading Moncton Hawks who were handed a decisive drubbing by the Saint John Beavers in the other night fixture of the Big Five.

Winger Buddy McEachern led the Truro attack, sniping one goal and drawing assists on three more. Chasing Services' Vic Jackson for loop scoring honors, Lou Medynski again deadlocked the race by picking up one tally and an assist, as did Bert Steele who came on with a strong two-way 'em.

Centre Bus O'Grady of Services was the only player to garner a pair of goals and defenceman Ralph Croucher came up with the only other Service marker, on a long blueline shot that Truro net milder Sunny MacDonald didn't see until too late.

Bearcats paid strict attention to flashy Vic Jackson of the Services squad and held the servicemen's star scoresless. Services' star scores were seven minor penalties, five of them in the last two periods against Bearcats.

Truro struck early and went off the ice at the end of the first period with a 4-2 lead which they quickly increased to 6-3 in the middle frame. The lone goal of Services in the last period came as the final whistle blew.

Truro opened early, scoring three goals in the first five minutes before McEachern, O'Grady got his second before the frame ended with Bob Greene setting up the play.

McEachern and Kearns started the third for Bearcats punishing one after the other in the first four minutes. Croucher followed up getting one for Services while Truro were one man short.

Both goalies were in top form in the final frame with the only marks going to Greene a few short seconds before the game ended.
