Helen is a free-legged pacer and her speed limits are as yet unknown, whatever next Saturday will bring forth in the 2.50 class. Ethel Todd raced well and picked out second money. She will soon be graduating to another class. Miss Claudia was stretching her straps in a few spots where she found suitable footing, she nosed out Lindy in the third heat and stayed third money. Lindy was making a real race in all three, but owing to the narrow tracks was unable to squeeze through to the front row. Witty C. and O'Quira also were to a disadvantage by being started in the second row. Coetta raced extra well considering her first start in company this season.

The 2.50 class was a genuine race of five heats and was well worth coming to see. Miss Kentucky winning the first heat by a close margin, the second going out to Emily Cope, the third to Lacona, the fourth to Ruby M., this summary at the finish of the fourth would keep

the cleverest guessing, the honors in the fifth was won by the noted reinsman Mr. George Woodside and his handsome little golden chestnut.

## BOXER IS SUSPENDED BY FIGHT SOLONS

### Is Barred For Failure To Go Through With Match.

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—Tony Cannoneri, popular Italian lightweight, today was suspended indefinitely by the New York State Athletic Commission. The suspension was in consequence with the action of the Pennsylvania Commission, which set him down for failure to go through with a match in Wilkes-Barre with Steve Smith.

The banning of Cannoneri came at the commission's regular meeting today. Dominico Vernasconi, Italian bantamweight title holder, froyed a challenge for Panama Al Brown's title but the boxing solons placed it on file without taking action.

Dave Shade fyled second challenge within two weeks for Mickey Walker's middleweight championship, but it, too, was placed on file. Walker is under suspension in New York for failure to defend his title.

Tony Martello, matchmaker for the Broadway Arena, was suspended on two counts—failure to appear in answer to a summons by the commission and for signing boxers under 21 years of age to fight more than six rounds.

## Must Be Entered By First Of March

A rare opportunity for the Breeders of the Standard Bred Horse is being offered by the Management of the Summerside Race Track this year. In order to stimulate the breeding operations on the Island and to give encouragement to the owners of young horses they have decided to put on a three year old race for a purse of three hundred dollars which will take place at Summerside on the first of July and should be one of the chief attractions.

In order that colts may be eligible to start in this race they must be entered on the first day of March when a small payment of three dollars is made. Colts do not have to be named until the first of June and if the colt that is entered on the first of March is for any reason unfit to race by that date another colt may be substituted. This gives plenty of leeway, so that a man is sure to have a chance to compete for a purse of this size with his three year old colt.

This race is confined to Prince Edward Island owned colts so that there will be no competition from abroad.

The Race will be in the form of a stake, for mile heats and on the three heat plan, and be divided 50% to horse winning first; 25% to horse winning second; 15% to horse winning third and 10% to horse winning fourth. National Trotting rules to govern.

The payments are as follows: 1% or three dollars, on the first of March; 2% on the first of May and the balance of 2%, or six dollars, on the first of June, when the colts name and breeding must be furnished. No additional charge is made except to money winners who shall be deducted the usual 5% from their earnings. Six to enter and four to start. All entrance money should be sent to the Secretary, Dr. W. G. Church, Summerside, who will give interested parties any information as to City.

## MICKEY WALKER HURTS HAND

BOSTON, Feb. 5.—The Boston Bruins took a wild and furious hockey game from the Detroit Cougars by a 3 to 1 score here tonight and then entertained 12,000 excited spectators with one of the most thrilling fist battles ever staged in the National League.

The players were quitting the ice when Eddie Shore, burly Boston defenseman player, and aggressive Rusty Hughes of the Cougars, exchanged right hand swings. After the referee separated them, Shore aimed several blows at Eddie Goodfellow, a Detroit forward, and when Referee George Mallison interfered the Boston player punched at him.

DETROIT, Feb. 5.—The bout between Mickey Walker, middleweight title holder, and Leo Lonski, scheduled for Olympia February 14, was postponed until February 21, yesterday, because of an injury to Walker's hand.
