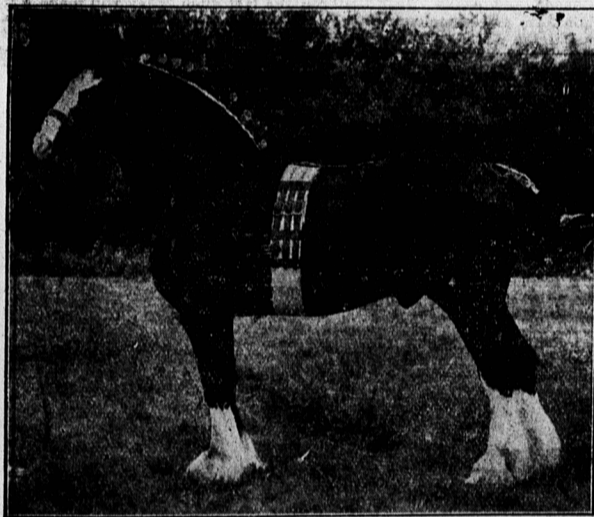

CAR FERRY STILL HELD IN ICE-The car ferry which left Borden at 9 a. m. on Saturday for Tormentine was still fast in the ice a short distance from Tormentine at a late hour last night. The Straits are jammed from shore to shore with heavy ice which was driven in by the recent north east storm. At Sackville there are 103 car loads of freight and at Tormentine 64, for the Island and at Borden there are 58 car loads including 12 of potatoes and 55 empty for the mainland. The trains are all running on time, a snow plough extra having cleared the track between Charlottetown, Borden and Summerside Sunday. Six feet of snow was reported in the Mitchell, Gillis and Oakes cuttings-west of Summerside the track is still quite heavy.
