Quebec Uncovers Ancient Mystery

MONTREAL, Dec 4.—While 20th century police officials groped to unravel modern mysteries, a crime of another generation—Montreal's forgotten murder, the slaying of Jean Aubuchon dit l'Espérance in the 17th century—was brought to light from the dusty archives in the Civic Court House here.

The time-worn documents containing the dossier of the case were uncovered by E. Z. Massicotte, metropolitan archivist, after he had seen an old letter published in the Bulletin des Recherches Historiques, organ of Quebec's Bureau of Archives. He was able to bring to light lines in regard to the victim's chequered career, but was unable to find out how he was slain.

According to the papers found, Aubuchon came from France and settled in Three Rivers in 1649, proceeded to Montreal two years later. While in Three Rivers he married Marguerite Sedillot. This marriage brought his first skirmish with the law as his wife was only 11 years of age. In 1657 he was heavily fined for trading liquor to the Indians for furs. In June 1660, he was convicted on a charge of seduction, fined again and banished from Montreal by the governor, Sieur de Maisonneuve. He returned a short time later, however and had no further trouble for 20 years, when he again ran foul of the law. This time his wife, managing a cabaret he owned, allowed four gamblers to play cards in the establishment for two days and two nights. The law at that time provided cafes and cabarets must close at 9 p. m.

On No. 30, 1685, he left his home to go to another residence he maintained in the centre of the town. He was not heard of until two days later, when his son found him in bed murdered. Authorities made an investigation but it came to nothing. It was reopened in 1692

In Thana, India, for alleged misconduct on her part, a caste woman was called before her people and after "trial" was auctioned off for \$20 and forced to marry. Nine persons were arrested as the result.

He claimed that he was innocent and claimed Aubuchon had been killed by his wife's maid. There were further inquiries and Pillereau was sent to Quebec for ensue, but was finally released as there was no direct evidence against him.

Aubuchon's widow was cleared of suspicion when authorities the day after her death of all criminal intent, and two years after her husband's brutal slaying she married a sergeant of the French troops stationed at Montreal.

Thus the Aubuchon case was put away among the records classified as a "mystery"—Montreal's first unsolved crime.

WILLIAM GORDON McSWAIN

An item appeared in the columns of the Charlottetown Guardian a few weeks ago relative to the tragic death in an automobile accident in Golden, B. C., of a former son of Prince Edward Island in the person of William Gordon McSwain. Further particulars have been received by relatives of the deceased in this province to the effect that the late Mr. McSwain was motoring unaccompanied in the vicinity of Golden, B. C. when in some unaccountable manner he evidently lost control of the car with the result that it plunged over an embankment and was overturned, causing instantaneous death to the occupant.

The late William Gordon McSwain was born in Mount Hope, Prince Edward Island forty five years ago, a son of Norman and Isabella (nee Isabel Nicholson) when a young man in his teens he lived for some years with his aunt Miss Flora A. Nicholson Dundas, and during those years made a home for himself in the city of Charlottetown and also in Annandale and surrounding districts where he was a familiar figure, by his genial manner, gentlemanly conduct and dependability. Some years ago he heaved chosen vocation abroad as evidenced by the fact that at the time of his tragic passing he held the responsible position of engineer.

There are left to mourn their loss a grief stricken widow in Golden, B. C., who will cherish the memory of a kind and loving husband, one brother J. D., in Edmonton, Alta., an uncle L. H. Nicholson and a niece, Margaret Rideout in Vancouver, B. C.

In addition to the above mentioned relatives there are left to mourn in this province, a sorrowing father, one sister Belle, Mrs. Russel Hunter, Strathcona, and the following half-brothers and sisters, Sterling and Sheldon, Mount Hope, Hattie, Mrs. George Perry, Elzers, Alta., Margaret, Mrs. Ewen Anderson, Charlottetown, Florence, Mrs. William Anderson, St. Peter's Bay, Mary, Mrs. Lloyd Cox, St. Peter's Bay, Mrs. John Howitt, Annandale and Miss Flora A.
