They also won first, second and third for buff Leghorns, cockerels; the same for black Minorcas; first for pen of silver-laced Wyandottes; second for cockerel and pullets of the same; first for B. B. Gamecock; second for Poland; and third for barred Rock pullet.

STORMS have been more or less frequent of late. Wednesday evening ushered in a rain and wind storm which called for the display of storm signals generally throughout the Province. The gale continued with more or less severity all day yesterday and last evening the wind blew with extreme violence and there was a heavy rainfall. No reports have so far been forthcoming from the country and it is trusted that not much injury has been done. The good steamer Northumberland crossed over successfully from Pictou to this port last evening, having a rough passage; but on the western route the storm was so threatening that the S. S. Empress did not leave Pt. du'ne on Summerside, and will not until the weather moderates. The train from the west came down to Charlottetown, however, arriving a little after 10 p. m. The telegraph lines west of Summerside are down and the telephone system was feeling the effects of the heavy gale, but communication by this means all over the Province was not interrupted. A number of schooners from outside came into this harbor to ride out the storm.

SEVERE STORM ON NEW ENGLAND COAST

Boston, Oct. 31—After an unusual spell of placid fall weather the last day of October brought a heavy northeast gale to the New England coast. Fortunately the greater portion of the coastwise sailing fleet, especially the little sailing craft, reached their destinations earlier in the week, so that very few were caught in exposed localities and up to a late hour tonight not a serious accident had been reported.

Coming on the full moon the storm brought a tremendous tidal wave upon the coast and some damage was done to the beaches and along the water front in the cities.

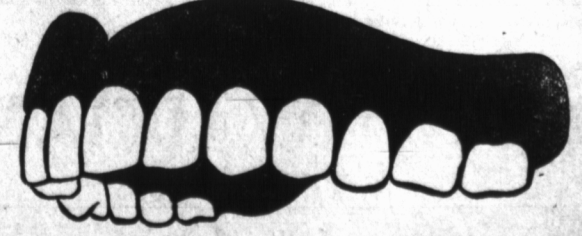
