The new mark replaced the one made in the Charlottetown Alleys of 3789 and came at a most opportune time, as it was the last scheduled game in the "Big Four" league.

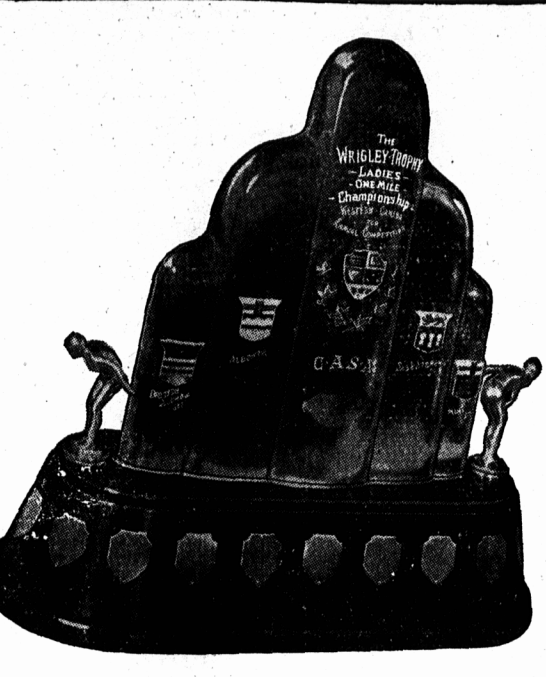

U.S. GOLFERS TAKE LEAD AT ST. ANDREWS

Visitors Win Three Out of Four Matches to Take Firm Grip on Series.

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, May 11—The young and old United States Walker Cup men forged brilliantly ahead of their British opponents today in the opening foursome skirmishes, winning three out of four matches and simplifying the task of keeping the international trophy on American shores for another two years.

All captain Francis Ouimet's golfing ambassadors need tomorrow is an even break in the eight singles matches to clinch victory for the eighth straight time since the biennial series were inaugurated in 1922. Even the most sanguine British supporters are willing to concede that much after a day in which Ouimet and George T. Dunlap, Jr., the United States amateur champion, were the victims of the lone British triumph scored by Eric McRivie and Jack McLean.

The turning point in the foursomes came this afternoon when Harry Bentley and Eric Fiddian, the No. 3 British team, lit a fire under Gus Moreland of Dallas Texas, and Jack Westland of Chicago, by winning two out of three holes on the outgoing nine and melting the American's lead.

"Let's get started," Moreland suggested to his sphinx-like partner and from there on their British opponents fell steadily behind until the swarthy Texas insurance salesman and the Chicago broker had closed the match on the 31st green, winning 6 and 5.

Overwhelming Triumph The overwhelming 8 and 6 triumph of Johnny Goodman, United States open champion, and W. Lawson Little, clubbing Californian, over Roger Wethered and Cyril Tolley was the heaviest blow to British hopes. Neither Tolley nor Wethered, who up to today had never been beaten in Walker Cup foursome play, could find a putting touch. Also the Briton's iron play was sadly off form.

The third United States victory was scored by the veteran combination of H. Chandler Egan and Max Marston, whose combined age fall a few years short of a century. They took into camp the Hon. Michael Scott, 56-year-old British captain and amateur champion, and Sam McKinley, who succumbed on the 34th hole, 3 and 2.

The lone casualty in the United States ranks was the No. 2 combination of Ouimet and Dunlap, who were vanquished by McRivie and McLean, the latter champion of both Ireland and Scotland, by a 4 and 2 margin.

The Americans could not overcome McRivie and McLean's two up lead at noon. The contest ended on the 34th green when Ouimet conceded the match after he and his partner had taken three strokes and their ball was still 12 feet away from the hole.

Although arrangements were made last night for his arrival, the Prince of Wales failed to put in an appearance at the matches, but wired the royal and ancient golf club that he would be on hand tomorrow for the singles warfare.
