**In Memoriam**

**R. N. MacDOUGALL**

TRURO, Dec. 11.—Robert Newton MacDougall, 84, retired C.N.R. employee and horse racing enthusiast died at his home, 140 Pleasant Street, Saturday afternoon following a heart attack. Born in Malpeque, P.E.I., a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Dougal MacDougall, the deceased became a resident of New Brunswick where he engaged in farming and horse breeding until 1898, when he came to Truro and associated with the C.N.R. retiring as foreman carpenter. Mr. MacDougall was a great admirer of horses, particularly racing animals, and during his life-time he travelled throughout the Maritime Provinces, attending numerous track competitions. He was a former member of the Forester Lodge and was associated with the local Amerson Club of retired railwaymen. He is survived by three daughters, Alice, Mrs. E. S. Gillespie, Truro, Eleanor, Mrs. H. E. Gribner, Buffalo and Miss Edna MacDougall, a nurse in Warsaw, New York. Mrs. MacDougall, formerly Edith L. Meffer, died a year ago.



**British Trade Shows Sign Of Recovery**

LONDON, Dec. 12 —(CP-Havas) —Signs of a recovery in British trade were mentioned by Sir John Simon, Chancellor of the Exchequer, in a speech before the National Union of Manufacturers today.

Saying that with the international situation so troubled and uncertain as at present, even limited indications of improvement were doubly significant and encouraging, Sir John added there were such signs.

Speaking of the rise of wholesale prices in non-ferrous metals between June and October, he said so considerable a change could not be attributed entirely to the fall of sterling.

The steady rise of industrial activity in the United States was more than a revival of the stock market, he said, and represented an industrial quickening which was bound to have repercussions on world trade.

"The figures for our own industrial activity," Sir John continued, "when due allowance is made for the time lag, are also showing signs that the United Kingdom is beginning to benefit from the upward movement."

"Another sign from which encouragement might be drawn is the fact that daily retail sales have increased by about 2-1/2 per cent this year as compared with 1937."

"There can be no comparison between our ability to withstand and tide over a trade setback today and our defenceless position in the crisis of 1931."

In the interval, he said, the Government had taken effective steps to secure the home market and had maintained the purchasing power of the consumers by a policy of cheap money.
