The S. S. City of London came in yesterday evening from Orwell, China Point and Belfast with 1200 bushels oats and 8 cases (government stamped) chickens for local dealers. The steamer returns to above ports again this morning weather permitting and on arrival at Charlottetown will go into winter quarters.

The regular monthly meeting of the School Board was held last night. Teachers' reports showed enrolment 1107, average attendance 1047, percentage 90, number tardiness cases 447, number truants 10, visits 217, notices 66, corporal punishments 32, below grading average 56, requests to leave school early 51. Christmas holidays were set down from Dec. 21st till Wednesday, Jan. 3rd. Joseph P. Monaghan, Kelly's Cross, was appointed Vice Principal of Queen Square School. Mr. Warburton's motion regarding increased salaries was discussed but action deferred. Meeting adjourned sine die.
