West. The judge added that \$1,000 of the bribe was paid to Lloyd by West during a January, 1948, hotel room conference.

Witnesses Called
After the grand jury returned a true bill against West today Deputy Mayor Harry Breen and Alderman J. G. DeWolf, City Council ad-

men at the time of the alleged negotiations, testified. The trial is expected to conclude tomorrow. Breen told the court that arrangements were made for West to come to Breen's home after West reached him by phone. He said he thought West's reason for coming was "that he was under the impression he had to pay off some of the Aldermen" and he told West he had the wrong impression. The deputy mayor testified that West told him he had already paid a sum of money at a hotel-room discussion of the sale of the snowblowers. The witness said West told him Lloyd had made a "promise" to promote the sale of the machines to the city and to solicit the support of other aldermen. He said he did not know if West were satisfied but "assumed" he was not. During cross-examination by R.A. Donahoe, West's counsel, Breen said he wasn't sure from his conversation with West whether Lloyd had asked for the money or whether it had been mutually agreed upon. Tells of Meeting DeWolf, who said he was present at Breen's home and heard the conversation with West, testified that West told them of meeting with Lloyd in the hotel room. During the conference, DeWolf testified, West said Lloyd asked "what's the angle?" and after receiving the invoices said "You will not miss \$500 per machine." DeWolf said West told them he had replied: "If that is the way I do business with the city of Halifax I am prepared to do so." The witness said Lloyd was said by West to have mentioned that the snowblower transaction was "not as good as the land deal and other transactions coming up. Of course not all the money goes to me. I have to pay off some of the other aldermen." Some can be bought for \$10."
