Livestock

MONTREAL, April 3—(CP)—There were 30 cattle, 3 sheep and lambs, 467 hogs and 297 calves for sale on Montreal livestock markets today.

Calves and hogs were easier, and the other classes of livestock remained steady.

There were not enough cattle and sheep to make a change in quotations.

Hogs were about 25 cents lower. Good quality veals made \$7 to \$7.50 with medium kinds around \$6.50.

The bulk of the calves were of common to just fair quality and were sold between \$5.50 and \$5.75. Very common light veals sold down to \$5.

Hogs were slow and easier. Bacon was \$9.25 to \$9.35 fed and watered. Selects drew \$1 per hog over grades. Sows were \$3.35 to \$3.75.

Hogs sold on rail grade brought mostly \$12.30 hot weight.

Rail grade hogs were \$12.10 hot weight on Maritime markets. All other prices of livestock were steady. Sows sold at \$7 to \$7.50 dressed.

Choice steers were \$7.25 and good \$6.75 medium \$6 fair \$5.50 common \$4. Choice heifers \$6.75 good \$6.25 medium \$5.50 fair \$5 common \$4. Good cows \$5.50 medium \$4.75 fair \$4. Canners and cutters \$2.50 to \$3.50. Bonning bulks were \$3.50 and butcher bulks \$4.75. Veal calves sold up to \$6.50 and grasters \$4.50. Lambs were \$9.

Modern Locomotives For The C. N. R.

MONCTON, N. B. April 1—The first of the fifteen new Canadian National "6100" northern type locomotives recently delivered to the railway by the builders, the Montreal Locomotive Works, for use on the Atlantic region arrived here this afternoon with a load of freight cars.

It was placed at the railway station shortly after arrival and was viewed by a large number of interested spectators, railway men and others.

Among those who inspected the new arrival were W. U. Appleton regional vice-president and general manager; W. E. Robinson, general superintendent of transportation and W. E. Bees, general superintendent of motive power and car equipment, Atlantic region.

The new locomotive is numbered 6165 and can exert a tractive effort of 37,000 pounds which can be increased by an auxiliary engine attached to the rear trailer truck known as a "booster" to 67,000 pounds.

These locomotives can haul freight trains of 100 or more cars at lower speeds and trains of from 50 to 75 cars at speeds in excess of 55 miles per hour which is demanded in fast freight service.

While primarily intended for freight, they can be used in passenger service and are capable of speeding over the rails with trains of from 15 to 20 cars at from sixty to eighty miles an hour.

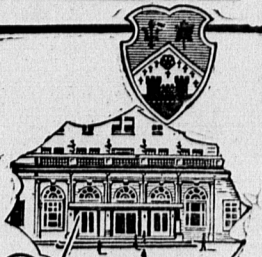
The total weight of the locomotives in working order is 343 tons. Driving wheels are 6 ft. 1 inch in diameter and the boiler carries a working pressure of 250 pounds of steam to the square inch.

They combine all the newest improvements of their type and are equipped with all the latest appliances.

ORANGE FROSTING
