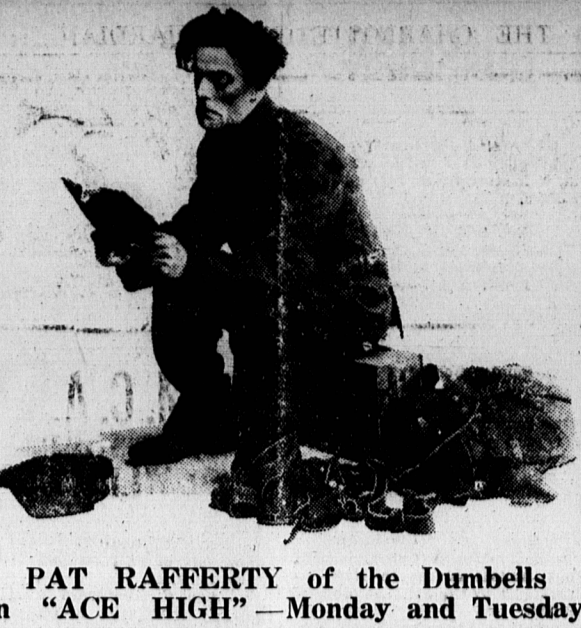

They were formerly selling for twenty-two and twenty-five cents per bushel. Mr. E. Boswell has one vessel loaded and two or three more on the way to be loaded with farm produce. It is anticipated that there will be further advances in the price of potatoes before spring and farmers will profit by holding their farm produce. Oats is likely to be higher in price. At the present time oats is selling at rural points for about sixty cents per bushel. At the same date last year they were selling for forty-five cents per bushel.
