MONDAY James and Mrs. Paton, Charlottetown, are at present visiting in Paris.

Miss Margaret Dougan, Charlottetown, left this morning on a visit to Boston and New York.

J. E. B. McCready of Charlottetown, has contributed an article on "The Emerald Isle of Canada" to the August Oakland Maple Leaf.

Norman Lund, of the brokerage office of F. B. McCurdy and Co., Halifax, formerly of Charlottetown, spent last Friday and Saturday with his parents, in Sackville and went to St. John, to relieve in the McCurdy office there.

At the Wednesday evening session of the Maritime Board of Trade in Truro the following resolution, moved by Capt. Read, Summerside, and seconded by C. McArthur, Summerside, was presented: "Resolved, that a better telegraph service between the mainland and P. E. I. is an urgent necessity." The inconvenience of

the present service was graphically portrayed by these and other gentlemen, who advocated the laying of a second cable. An amendment was moved by E. T. Higgs and seconded by R. H. Jenkins, Charlottetown, acting upon the suggestion of the President the contending parties conferred together and agreed upon the following: "Whereas, the Dominion Government is under statutory obligations to maintain telegraphic communication with P. E. I., under the Act of Confederation; and whereas, the present service is inefficient, unsatisfactory, expensive and frequently interrupted by the breaking of the cable. Therefore, be it resolved that the Maritime Board of Trade now in session in Truro, request the Dominion Government to take immediate steps to place the telegraphic service between P. E. I. and the mainland on such a basis as will ensure a continuous service, equal in cost and efficiency to that enjoyed by the people of the mainland. And in the opinion of this Board a second cable is necessary in order to do this." Passed unanimously.

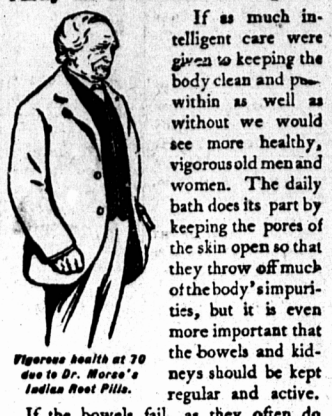

He urged on his hearers the necessity of Bible Study as the only means of ascertaining the truth. He is a speaker of good address, fluent and convincing. Frequent interruptions were caused by people leaving the hall whilst Mr. Rutherford was speaking.

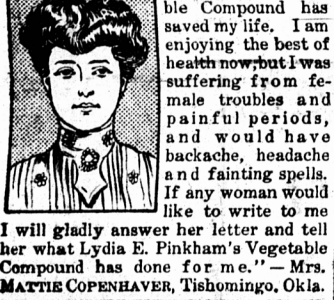

George Hennessey, who has been visiting in Charlottetown, the guest of his brother, Mr. and Mrs. Hennessey, leaves this morning on return to Chicago where he will join the Chapel (Car of the Church Extension Society, of which he is business manager. This Society has been provided with a new car, manufactured by Barney & Smith and is one of the finest cars ever turned out of those shops in magnificence. It contains a handsome chapel accommodating 75 people and also living and sleeping accommodations for the chaplain and others. It is of steel construction and is finished in Cuban mahogany, and when completed will cost \$25,000. The new car is called St. Peter's, the old one being St. Anthony's. The car goes through the small towns and districts in which there are no churches. Thirty new edifices have been built besides the regular mission work in the past 2 1/2 years. On Sept. 1st the new car leaves Chicago and will proceed on a tour through Wisconsin, Minnesota, South Dakota, Washington, and back through Idaho. Through each diocese a new chapel is provided. The founder and president of the society is Dr. Kelly, a native of Charlottetown. Dr. Kelly preached at the dedication of the car in Dayton, Ohio, on June 30th. Besides his other duties Mr. Hennessey, who is possessed of a good voice, lends his assistance in a musical way during the services.

Mrs. James A. Campbell of Bull's Head played the wedding march, and T. G. A. Sutherland of Kensington, was the officiating clergyman. Immediately after the ceremony a reception was held when the many guests present extended their best wishes to the bride and groom. The wedding repast was excellent in every way. The charitable party, composed of young people of the vicinity, assembled and contrib-

ed their part to the evening's pleasure. The wedding presents were numerous and costly, among which might be specially mentioned a beautiful gold watch and chain from the father of the bride. The bride and groom are very popular, and have the best wishes of a host of friends at home and abroad.

A sad fatality occurred at Summerside yesterday afternoon about four o'clock when Joseph Provost, 1st mate on the schooner Arizona, lost his life in a fall from the masthead to the deck.

The deceased was working on the mast and suddenly something gave way and the unfortunate man was precipitated to the deck, a fall of about sixty feet. He struck the deck rail and fell overboard. The body, which floated to the surface, was secured with as little delay as possible and medical assistance was summoned.

The coroner, Dr. Jardine, was also sent out by inquest was under the circumstances deemed unnecessary, in the fall it was ascertained that the deceased broke his neck, meeting instant death.

He was a native of Arichat, C.B., where his widow resides. One of his sons was employed on the schooner with him. The remains were forwarded to Charlottetown on the express last night and will cross on the Northumberland this morning en route to Arichat for interment. The son to Arichat, aged about twenty, and Captain Boudreau accompanied the body to Charlottetown and wired the sad news to the deceased's home after arriving here. The son will accompany his father's remains home in the schooner Arizona arrived in Summerside yesterday with a cargo of coal and was to sail after discharging for Newcastle, N. B. She is in command of Capt. Boudreau and has a crew of four men.

The sad occurrence has elicited much sympathy for the deceased and his bereaved family.

Capt. Boudreau stated to a Guardian representative last evening that the Arizona had met with very heavy weather en route from Sydney and that when she arrived in Summerside her mainmast was sprung. All day and within five minutes of the occurrence he had been working on the mast with the deceased mate and only five minutes previous to the accident he had descended for some reason. The first he knew of the mate being in difficulty was on getting to the masthead and he looked up in time to see the deceased leave his hold and fall to the rail. The cargo will be discharged in Summerside and repairs will be effected to the mast. The deceased leaves a widow, one son, Charles, and five daughters, all born in N. B. Capt. Boudreau returns to Summerside this morning.
