Dr. Heartz goes in the emergency caused by the death of Rev William Purvis and will spend four Sabbaths in the Sunny Isles.—Wesleyan. At the Police Court in this City Saturday morning the prohibition case against Roy Essery was adjourned until this morning. W. McVay, was fined four dollars or twenty days for fast driving on the streets. E. White charged with same offence was dismissed. C. D. Rankin confessed to a breach of the Prohibition Act and was fined \$100 and costs. An Amherst exchange says: We regret to chronicle today the death of Ralph Lawrence Luby, the young son of Mr and Mrs Luby, Albion Street. The funeral will take place on Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock.—William Luby of Manson, Maine, arrived home to attend the funeral of his young brother which took place on Sunday, Feb 27th. Much sympathy is expressed for the family who at one time resided in this city. L. W. Archibald, Secretary of the Charlottetown Y. M. C. A., returned to the city Saturday from Truro, N. S., where he had been attending a meeting of the Maritime Committee of the Y. M. C. A. There were about thirty-five present from the three provinces. At this meeting Fraser G. Marshall, Maritime Secretary, who has held that office for eighteen years, tendered his resignation on account of ill health. The committee asked Mr Marshall to withhold his notice of resignation for some time and granted him a leave of absence for a period of three months after which his resignation if still desired it, will receive reconsideration. The arrangements for the coming Maritime Boys Camp and the Boy's Institute's annual outings were completed and dates and places arranged as follows: Boys Institute at Big Cove, N.
