By its adoption, they contended, Germany has fulfilled all her disarmament obligations, and there was now no further excuse for the continued occupation of German soil.

Various speakers before the Reichstag declared that, inasmuch as the bill was imposed upon Germany by the allied powers, it was a violation of German sovereignty, but admitted that it was a political necessity. By its adoption, they contended, Germany has fulfilled all her disarmament obligations, and there was now no further excuse for the continued occupation of German soil.

In Memoriam

JOHN ANDREW STEWART

On June 22nd, 1927, John Andrew Stewart, died in Camp Hill Hospital, Halifax, N. S. He was buried the following Saturday at 2 p. m. in the Cross Roads cemetery. Although it was election day (one of the busiest days in the history of this Island) the funeral was largely attended, there being fifty automobiles, ten carriages, and scores of people on foot. Rev. Bruce Muir, of St. James Church, Charlottetown, and Rev. R. W. Lindsay of the Baptist Church officiated. The music, under the direction of Rev. R. W. Lindsay and Mrs. Alfred Stewart, organist of the Baptist Church, was solemn and impressive. The Great World War Veterans Association of Charlottetown, marched in front of the hearse. The bugler, sounded the Last Post at the grave. The pall bearers were—Charles P. Stewart, Alfred Stewart, John MacDonald, J. Pendragast, William Duffy, and James McCallum.

Teaching Sisters to Further their Studies

OTTAWA, July 12.—A number of the Sisters of the staff of the Congregation de Notre Dame are leaving for various educational centres in Canada and the United States to follow special courses. The Sister in charge of the Art Department has left for Montreal and Quebec to study under expert professors. The sister in charge of the High School has gone to Boston to follow courses at Copley Square school of expression and pedagogy, and the teacher of the French Graduating class, accompanied by other sisters, has left for Montreal to study at the Marguerite Bourgeoys School of Pedagogy Institute. Others have a total of \$27,867.109. Nova Scotia has gone to Kingston to continue courses at Queen's University, and severally more will take advantage of the Department of Education's course at \$500,000. Ontario declined by nearly \$300,000 to a total of \$3,162,193. Quebec gained slightly to a total of \$3,110,964. Manitoba gained nearly \$900,000 to a total of \$2,328,803. Prince Edward Island lost about \$240,000, for a total of \$1,358,934.

PRODUCTION OF FISHERIES SHOWS BIG GAIN IN VALUE
