A largely attended dairy meeting was held in Lorne Valley on Wednesday, the 24th inst., and was addressed by Harvey Mitchell of the Dairy Commissioner staff, Ottawa. Mr. Mitchell delivered a valuable lecture on dairying and illustrated his remarks by the use of five charts. He said it was a one hundred million dollar (\$100,000,000) business they were dealing with. He claimed that a record of performance was better than a pedigree without a record. The first chart dealt with fodder value and fertilizer; the second with a comparison of two herds of milk cows; the third showed the value of taking care of the cows; the fourth gave a sample of weeding out unprofitable cows from a herd; and the fifth and last chart showed the difference in the production of six herds, the first three herds with no records kept and the last three herds of which records were kept. A vote of thanks moved by Neil McConnell and seconded by Angus MacLeod, was tendered by the chairman, Alex. C. MacDonald, to the lecturer, to which he fittingly replied.
