BRITAIN AND THE UNITED STATES.

The Boston Herald has a long article on the surprising change in feeling among the public men of the United States toward Great Britain, from the unreasoning jealousy and hostility of a few years ago, to the warm friendship of today, in which the Mother Country is assumed to be the disinterested friend of the Republic. The Herald proceeds—

The change is so extreme as to produce wonder and amazement in the ordinary mind. Never was any revolution more radical. And it is all brought about without any reason being given for it. Nothing has transpired in the past three years to afford grounds to believe that Great Britain is any better disposed toward the United States than she was before that time, except her own professions. But professions are easily made. Nothing could cost England less than to declare her sympathy with the United States in the late struggle with Spain. The strange feature about it is that the politicians of the country, who were so quick to find a motive for all Great Britain had done before that affected this country, and that a motive governed by self-interest that was inimical to the United States, should be swift to assume that there is no interested motive in Great Britain's present attitude toward our nation. We are much inclined to think that the British public men who have held out this recent bait to our politicians, smile at the eagerness with which they have absorbed it.

The Herald is unfair in its statement that there was neither cost nor risk in the attitude of friendship assumed by Great Britain toward the United States at the beginning of the war. It is well known that at that time the powers of continental Europe were eager to intervene, and but for the resolute action of the British government in opposition to that course the combined fleets of France, Russia and Germany would have appeared in West India waters and check mated the American war programme. In face of such a combination not a single ship of the United States fleet would have dared to sail on a hostile mission toward any Spanish possession.

Nor was it without risk that Britain took this position. Her relations with at least two of the continental powers were strained, and there was grave danger that by the new crisis the breaking point might be reached and a great European war precipitated. This risk was taken largely on sentimental grounds, because of kinship, and without hope of reward. At that time it was generally supposed that the fleets of Spain were equal in effective fighting force to those of the United States, and that in the event of a general European embroilment resulting the United States could render no assistance by land or sea to Great Britain.

The Herald proceeds to speak of the

general desire of the British people that the United States shall retain possession of the Philippines, because it would be a support to British interests in the East. No doubt the desire now exists, but that is a matter altogether apart from the action of Britain in holding off the continental powers from intervening at the commencement of the war. The acquisition of the Philippines was not then thought of, even at Washington. It was before Dewey's victory at Manila was gained that Britain's diplomatic action and the known strength of her ready fleets, saved the United States from being checkmated by superior force.

The general sentiment of the people of the United States is more just than the Boston Herald, and recognises the fact that in the late war Britain stood the disinterested friend of the Republic and took grave risks in its behalf. It is for this reason that old-time jealousies have sunk out of sight and old-time hostility has been appeased. The Mother Country was friendly to the United States before the Spanish war, but her friendship was doubted and misunderstood. The war enabled the British government and people to display their friendship in a manner that could not be mistaken, either by the people of the United States or those of other nations.

Four or five vacancies for which elections are to be held on 14th December were held by Liberals or Independents since the last election. The one exception is Bagot, Quebec, which has held to the Conservative faith ever since confederation. So strong are the Conservative influences in this particular county that it has four times returned members of that faith by acclamation.
