Alberton Potato Growers Request Permanent Floor

A largely attended meeting of interested farmers was held in the Institute Hall, Alberton on Dec. 17. This meeting was called by their Provincial representative, Mr. Fred C. Ramsay, M.L.A. of Montrose, in order that the potato producers themselves might have the opportunity of discussing matters associated with their business of growing potatoes. Mr. Russell Leard of Cascoque acted as chairman of the meeting and Mr. Forrest W. Phillips as secretary. The chairman, Mr. Leard, praised Mr. Ramsay's efforts on behalf of his fellow farmers, especially in the most important cash crop. Many items of interest were freely discussed by those present, including floor prices, limitation of acreage, quotas, tariff, freight rates, dehydration, potato diseases, etc. Those taking an active part in the discussion were Mr. Wallace, Mr. Oliver, Mr. Pridham, Mr. Ramsay, Mr. Forrest Phillips, Mr. O'Brien, Mr. Willie, Mr. Thomas, Mr. Leard, Mr. Bonness, Mr. Irving Hardy, Mr. McLellan, Mr. Harvey and others.

Support Price Discussed

Mr. Ramsay explained that for the first time in Canada's history a support price had been supplied the potato producers, but he said adjustments would likely be made to its present form, as it did not provide sufficient protection to farmers who were forced to sell at a price below their cost of production. He also thought the price insufficient to pay cost of production under present conditions. But he contended that it was a start, and it was up to all to work to improve the position. He explained that the western wheat growers struggled for years before obtaining their first floor price of 60 cents per bushel, and now they were receiving \$1.35 per bushel, plus a five year guarantee at the same price.

There was a general feeling that Premier J. Walter Jones had helped the grower considerably by recently securing the price of the bag in addition to the first price set, and by having it on April 1st instead of May 1st. Mr. Ramsay thought a permanent floor could only be workable by limiting the acreage to a percentage of a farmer's clear land, and by co-operating with the United States. After the general discussion a resolution committee was formed, comprising Messrs. Fred C. Ramsay, M.L.A., Lester Wallace, Forrest W. Phillips, M.L.A., Harry Pridham and Ramsay Hardy.

Resolutions

The following resolutions were unanimously adopted: "Whereas the present support price on potatoes does not provide ample protection to the grower, due to the price not being sufficient to pay cost of production and not being made effective at the beginning of the potato harvest. "Be it therefore resolved that the following recommendations be made to the Federal Dept. of Agriculture: "1. That a permanent floor on potatoes be established. "2. That the floor price be not less than cost of production, plus a reasonable profit. "3. That the acreage grown to potatoes be limited to a percentage of a farmer's clear land. "4. That inspection of acreage be carried out at the time inspection is made for disease. "5. That our Federal Government ask the co-operation of the United States in establishing a joint permanent floor. "6. That the United States Government be asked to raise its quota, and to reduce its tariff on potatoes, in line with that of Canada's."

Moved by Mr. Ramsay Hardy, seconded by Mr. J. W. O'Brien, and carried by Mr. Ramsay Hardy, a resolution was adopted protesting the contemplated Federal increase of 30 per cent in freight rates. It was moved by Mr. Wm. Bonness, seconded by Mr. Chester Wallace, and carried that a snow plow be loaned in Alberton for the service of the First District. And that snow fences be supplied where needed.
