The latest news, first of all.
 The mail train arrived in this city last night at ten thirty-five.

The Northumberland took about fifteen passengers across to Pictou yesterday morning.

Rev. Geo. E. Ross will deliver a discourse to students at the evening service tomorrow in Zion Church.

Rev. D. McLean, Watermere, who has been visiting in the United States for the past six weeks, returned home last night.

An agricultural meeting will be held in the Consolidated School at Hillsboro, on Tuesday evening, May 17th, at 8 p. m. An illustrated address on the "Care of Milk for cheese-making" will be delivered by Mr. Barr, Chief Dairy Division, Ottawa. Everyone interested is invited to be present.

A number of members of the Guardian staff viewed Halley's comet on Friday morning between three-thirty and four o'clock. The comet was seen well up in the sky above and to the left of the morning star and although the eastern section of the sky was slightly clouded over, the comet appeared at intervals in the opening rifts. It appears considerably larger than the morning star, but not nearly so bright—something like a snowball against the blue of the sky. No tail was visible to the naked eye, partly because the dawn light tended to make it invisible, and partly because the tail being turned so nearly toward the earth. If it were visible it would be greatly shortened in appearance from being in this position.

After passing through a steady and continuous three days of a fierce blizzard, with the wind howling along at 90 miles an hour, sending mountainous seas almost up to the funnel and encasing the ship in a solid armor of ice, the Government steamer Minto, with eight Marconi wireless wizards on board, steamed into North Sydney last Sunday morning. It was weather the likes of which Captain Finlayson, with his nearly fifty years of sea experience, never heard of in the month of May. Two weeks before the Minto left Pictou with Marconi men for the Gulf and Labrador stations. The first stop was at Point, where Messrs. Strickland, Ross and Collins were left. Then to Heath Point where Boutlier, Handson and Webb were marooned. The weather, after leaving the latter place, began to assume the proportions of an old fashioned Cape Breton winter but when Harrington was reached the weather was simply here, a blizzard striking up that awed even Captain Finlayson. Not even his worst experiences in his many memorable and trying struggles in "crossing the Capes" would compare in severity with the conditions prevailing at this bleak region. However, through it all, Messrs. Greig (formerly of Cape Bear, P. E. I.) and Dawson were landed. While this was going on the steam donkeys became frozen and all kinds of trouble was experienced, it being no easy task for the crew to work with mountains of sea sweeping the steamer from stem to stern. These hitherto unknown weather conditions were not on Captain Finlayson's bill of fare, and the delay this caused played heavily on the coal and water supply, so much so indeed that the veteran commander was obliged to sail for North Sydney replenish his bunkers. On the way down the Minto called at Cape Bay, where construction superintendent Taylor and operator Argue were left. On board the Minto are Charley Fraser and Taylor, who go to Point Rich station; Hood and Delaney, whose quarters will be at Point Armour; and Jack Bartlett, Clarke and Renie, who will go to Belle Isle. Last year the Marconi men did not take up their different stations until the middle of June.

The Guardian is pleased to inform their friends that the report that J. Gordon Worth, and W. D. Gillis, City, were leaving this morning for Calgary, is entirely without foundation.

At a meeting of a number of citizens in the office of D. J. Bonnell, Cameron Block, City, last evening, in connection with the arranging of programs for certain days throughout the summer months, a committee was appointed to confer on the matter and report at a later meeting to be announced. It is the intention of the movers in this instance to provide special attractions in the line of sport, etc. in order to draw larger crowds to the city on certain days in the week during the summer. The movement includes an agitation for special train arrangements and rates for the days to be named.

What is probably the largest lobster ever caught in this province was taken from Little Harbor, near Chestow, Kings County, last Wednesday by a fisherman there. This magnificent lobster is now in the possession of J. J. Hornby City, and its dimensions are as follows: Circumference of body, 21 inches; length from tip of tail to eye, 21 1/2 inches; length over all, 37 1/2 inches; width of claw, 16 inches; length of claw, 12 inches; gross weight 17 lbs. Mr. Hornby is having it mounted and it will probably be placed on exhibition.

James Paton, City, made the round trip on the Northumberland yesterday.

The death of Captain Hugh McLean (Orwell), for many years a resident of Charlottetown, came as a shock to his many friends yesterday. He will be remembered as Captain of the Heather Bell, sailing between Crapaud, Orwell, East River and Charlottetown. Captain McLean was a native of Charlottetown. After the loss of the Heather Bell, he became Captain of the Jacques Cartier, and later on the ferry service here. He was an excellent mariner and had a host of acquaintances, who will learn with sorrow of his demise. Captain McLean was a man of excellent character and much respected. A widow and one daughter, Mrs. L. R. Ings, of Orwell Cove survive. To the bereaved all tender most respectful sympathy. The remains will be brought to Charlottetown on Sunday by train, and the service will be held shortly after 3 p.m. in Zion Church, which the late Captain for many years attended. After the service the procession will reform and march to the station thence by train to Sherwood Cemetery.

With her canvas almost reduced to shreds, and with her owner and crew feeling the effects of their terrible experience, the old P. E. Island schooner Baltic, built in Essex, Mass., in 1847, of solid oak limped into port Saturday and tied up at Brennan's wharf. This was not originally intended as the schooner's destination for when she left Cardigan, P. E. I., two weeks ago yesterday with twenty

head of fat cattle and as many sheep besides a general cargo of farm produce, she cleared for the French colony of St. Pierre, Mig. On board the Baltic, commanded by captain Austin Jackson, one of the hardiest of mariners, was Hon. J. G. Scrimgeour, owner of the schooner and cargo. After leaving the Island, the Baltic made good progress, but Wednesday night she ran into one of the stiffest kind of blows, accompanied by rain. Head winds drove the old craft out of her way and try as he could Captain Jackson was unable to make an inch headway. By this time the fury of the storm was awful, and in referring to the trip Mr. Scrimgeour said he never expected to again see land. "How Captain Jackson ever managed to keep the ship from swamping," said the honorable gentleman to The Herald, "will remain a mystery to me. It was really awful to look up at times and see nothing but a frowning mountain of seething treacherous waters, upon which in the twinkling of an eye you would find yourself resting and looking downwards into the black depths of churning sea." For forty-eight hours Captain Jackson was lashed to the wheel, while the little crew at great sacrifice stood by and rendered every aid to the awed dumb brutes, who were tossed about in their stalls like bean stalks. The Baltic however rode out the storm and was steered to this port without any loss except the sails. Mr. Scrimgeour disposed of the cattle and sheep to local parties, and will also sell the farm produce here, and after effecting repairs will take a cargo of coal to Charlottetown.
