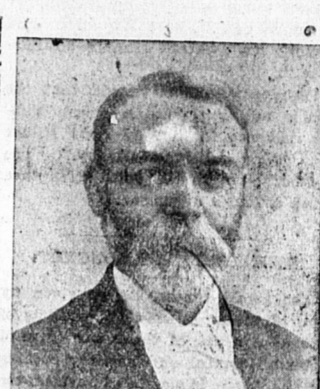

VERDICT OF CORONER'S JURY

Enquiry Into Death of Sergeant Urquhart. Killed on Military Train.

MONCTON, Aug. 17--Dr. L. C. Harris, sitting as coroner to enquire into the death of Sergeant Urquhart, of St. John, who fell off the military train near Harcourt while on the way to Quebec on the 19th of July (last), brought the enquiry to a close on Saturday afternoon. The only witness examined was Leonard Anderson. The jury after deliberating for a short time brought in the following verdict: That Sergeant Tillie Urquhart came to his death by falling headlong from the military train, in very rapid motion, while in a scuffle with Sergeant Murray, where he (Sergeant Urquhart) had come contrary to orders. The evidence shows lax discipline on the military train. It may be noted here that the military enquiry into Sergeant Urquhart's death held by the authorities in St. John, exonerated Sergeant Murray.
