He was a native of Newfoundland but has resided for many years in Charlottetown where he carried on boat building and also carpentering. He was a good workman and an excellent citizen in every respect. The deceased was a prominent Mason, having occupied the office of Tyler for a number of years.

RECEIVES SAD NEWS.—A telegram received by Mr. Peter B. Gallant of Summerside Wednesday morning contained sad news of the death of his son George Gallant, which took place at the General Public Hospital, St. John, N. B. Mr. Gallant, several days ago, was badly injured by being struck by a street-car in Briton St., St. John, causing a fractured skull. The body is expected to arrive in Summerside to-night (Thursday) where interment will take place.

ARMISTICE DAY CELEBRATION.—Armistice Day will be observed on Sunday, November 11th, by the usual parade of veterans, who will form up in units at 10.15 a.m. the G. W. V. A. rooms on Gratton Street. The parade will then march by way of Queen Street, Richmond Street, Prince Street and up Gratton Street, to the site of the new monument, where a cenotaph will be erected and the service held. The members of the Government, the Judiciary and the City Council will attend. The service will begin with the arrival of His Honor the Lieut. Governor and the playing of the National Anthem. The Rev. (Capt.) G. C. Taylor will then conduct a memorial service until 11 o'clock, when the two minute silence will be observed. The service will then be completed by the sounding of the Last Post, and the placing of wreaths.

Monthly Meeting of Y. M. C. A. Directors

The regular monthly meeting of the Charlottetown Y. M. C. A. Board of Directors was held on Tuesday, Nov. 6th. The President, Mr. J. A. Clark, was in the chair. Others present were: Mr. A. C. Duchemin, J. D. Jenkins, J. Harry Williams, Dr. Ayers, Dr. Dewar, H. E. Miller, J. A. McMillan, R. A. Pendleton, P. W. Turner, and J. T. McKenzie.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

REPORT OF COMMITTEES House Committee:—Details of improvements effected during the season were presented and the report adopted.

Physical Committee:—Mr. J. A. McMillan read the report of the Physical Director, Report adopted.

Finance Committee:—Mr. W. A. Stewart presented the Finance Committee's report which was moved by Mr. Stewart, seconded by Dr. Ayers, and carried. It was moved by Mr. A. C. Duchemin and seconded by Mr. J. H. Williams that the Finance Committee be authorized to pay all approved outstanding accounts upon request.

Membership Committee:—The Membership Report was read by Dr. Ayers showing the creditable roll of 509 members.

Religious Work Committee:—In the absence of the chairman the General Secretary gave the Religious Work Report and suggested a programme for the week of prayer. On general programme the Committee reported good progress.

Educational Committee:—The educational report was given by Dr. J. H. Ayers who reported that the committee were putting on a course of public speaking led by Rev. W. O. Mulligan and there were prospects for a series of lectures. The report was adopted.

Boys Work Committee:—Mr. Williams reported the difficulty in procuring men of the proper calibre to associate with him in heading up the activities of a Boys Work Programme outlined by the general secretary. Mr. Williams' report showed promise of a live Boys Work Committee.

General Secretary's Report:—This report showed great activity in the Boys Work. Several hikes were carried out very successfully. The report referred to Mr. T. D. Patton's visit. Also to the successful tea held by the Ladies Auxiliary. Report was adopted.

New Business:—The President reported that Mr. M. Harlow of Inglewood would visit Charlottetown, Nov. 24th, 25th and 26th.

The general secretary explained the object of the "H-Y" Meet at Moncton Nov. 9th, 10th and 11th. Charlottetown will be represented by four or more boys. It was moved by Dr. Ayers, seconded by Mr. J. A. McMillan that our General Secretary be granted leave to attend the Meet, and the Association pay his expenses.

The meeting was closed with prayer by Dr. Ayers. Adjournment.

October is the usual month for setting up programs and getting the season's activities started. It was no exception this year but the exceptional fine weather all through the month kept gym classes from getting into full swing and social activities within the building.

The month saw real activities with regard to memberships and collection of pledges. Most of the directors gave their lists every attention, there are still forty or fifty names yet to be reported on.

GENERAL ACTIVITIES

Gymnasium Classes are pretty well started and are coming along better every day. The report of the physical director to the Physical Committee has dealt with this in detail. Billiards—A very successful Tournament has been conducted all through the month and has done much to stimulate the interest in the game. It is expected that November will see a large number enrolled in a handicap tournament.

Bowling: This popular feature of our programme is meeting with greater success than ever, fully 120 men are registered on twelve teams, eight of which are in the City League and four in the Odd Fellows League. Matches are being rolled on every night but Saturday.

The leagues are bringing many visitors to our building and it is hoped that our membership will be considerably enlarged on account of it.

The Y. M. C. A. team is leading the City League at present.

Outings: During the month five outings were held for our junior members, three being bicycle rides and two being hikes.

At eleven o'clock each Saturday morning your Sect'y took the boys out, the parties having dinner and supper at some point five or ten miles from the city. A programme of games, races, etc., was arranged each time, the party returning to town about 7 p.m. Forty-seven boys attended this month.

W. T. A. Pattern: The outstanding event of the month was the visit of Mr. Patton of the National Council, Toronto, who spent the three days in Charlottetown. A full programme was arranged and carried out during this visit. Two staff meetings were held. Mr. Patton addressed the Rotary Club and the scholars of West Kent School as well as our Board and several committees.

Your staff felt greatly benefited by the visit of our National Council representative and are awaiting with pleasure Mr. Lou Buckley's visit on Nov. 14th and 15th.

Supper and Bible Study are now a regular feature with our newly organized Leaders Corps which meets every Wednesday at 6 p.m.

W. T. A. High Tea: A most successful High Tea was staged by our Ladies Auxiliary on Oct. 25th in Zion Hall when over 300 suppers were served.

The ladies are to be highly commended for this event, which will bring \$145.00 clear to the Association. Mrs. W. W. Owen and her able committee worked hard and earnestly to make this undertaking a success.

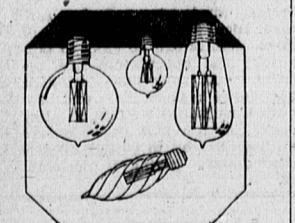

Minutes of the P. E. I. Presbytery

The Presbytery of P. E. I. met in regular session in Zion Hall on Tuesday, Nov. 6th, with an attendance of twenty-four ministers and seven elders. Mr. Stirling, the Moderator, presided.

The minutes of the meeting held on Aug. 7th were sustained. Mr. J. A. MacLellan moved that the congratulations of the court be presented to Mr. J. M. MacLeod, of St. Peter's on the honor conferred upon him in being elected as Moderator of Synod in St. John last October. This was suitably done by the Moderator.

The clerk reported that a call had come to his hands from the congregation of Glen Safield, in Ontario, in favor of Mr. B. V. MacLean, of Tyne Valley. It was accompanied by a guarantee of attendance for \$1800. Tyne Valley congregation was represented by Mr. Dougherty, who made a forceful plea for the retention of Mr. MacLean in his present charge. Mr. MacLean, however, felt it his duty, all things considered, to accept the call, and Presbytery agreed to his translation to take effect after next Sunday. Mr. Pattrie, of O'Leary, was appointed interim moderator of the vacant congregation.

At the afternoon session which did not convene until nearly five o'clock, the time was taken in a discussion of the temperance situation in the Island. The following resolution moved by Mr. A. W. Robertson of Kensington, expressed the mind of the court:

"Whereas, it is a matter of common knowledge that an intolerable condition obtains, in the violation of our prohibition laws; therefore, be it resolved that we, the Presbytery of P. E. I. urge upon our members to use more zealous efforts for a strict enforcement of these laws and for the conduct of an educational campaign on the evil of the use of intoxicants, and that a committee be appointed to follow this matter up."

The following committee was appointed:—A. W. Robertson, E. Lockhart, R. H. Stavert, G. S. Mitchell and W. O. Mulligan.

At the evening session various routine matters were disposed of. The Budget allocations to congregations for next year are the same as for the present year.

Messrs. Mitchell, Robertson, Murchison, Wm. Brown and John Simpson were appointed a committee to consider remits from the Assembly and report to the March meeting.

Messrs. MacNeill, MacLellan, MacDonald, were appointed to nominate the Standing Committees and report to the March meeting.

Mr. Stirling's motion it was agreed that the March meeting of Presbytery should convene at twelve o'clock noon, thus allowing the preceding hour for committee work.

The needs of the Protestant Orphanage were presented in a letter read by Mr. Mulligan. Presbytery agreed to commend these needs to the attention of our people and suggested that a philanthropic committee be appointed in each congregation to help the Orphanage.

A strong committee with Presbyterial powers, consisting of Messrs. MacLellan, MacLeod, MacVicar, Lockhart and Stirling, was appointed to consider and arrange for the supply of certain vacant congregations in the eastern end of the Island.

Presbytery adjourned to meet at the call of the Moderator and close

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
