

SMALLPOX CASES IN CUMBERLAND

Number Six Hundred, and C. R. Orders Special Precautions.

TRURO, Dec. 5. (Special)—The smallpox situation in Cumberland County, has assumed so serious a phase that a special danger order has been issued by District Supt. Jarvis of the I. C. R. as follows: "At the request of the board of health of Cumberland county, orders have been issued that no persons be allowed to leave Springhill without a permit from the chairman of the board of health, stating that the traveller has been successfully vaccinated and has not been exposed to the contagion of smallpox."

C.P.R. EARNINGS DURING OCTOBER

Nearly Seven Million Dollars, Increase of \$1,250,000 Over October 1905

MONTREAL, Dec. 3.—Once again has the Canadian Pacific railway broken all records for earnings, as shown by the figures issued recently for the month of October when the earnings of the system almost reached seven million dollars. This is an increase of nearly a million and a quarter over the same months last year, and about eight hundred thousand dollars more than the company ever before earned in one month. Since the first of July the gross earnings of the company in its railway, steamship, telegraph, hotel and other departments, has reached the total of \$25,337,792—so that the officials are looking for a new record of something like \$75,000,000 for the year. The tremendous growth of the company's earnings shown by the fact that last year their gross receipts were \$41,833,031, which was an increase of ten million dollars over any previous year, while if the present rate of earnings keeps on the receipts of this year will beat last year's record by another ten millions.

During the October just passed the gross earnings of the C. P. R. were \$6,946,005; during the same period last year they were \$5,722,707, an increase this year of \$1,223,298—the largest increase for any single month in the history of the road. The working expenses for the same month were \$1,161,717, as compared with \$1,171,983. This leaves net profits for the same month of \$2,794,287, an increase of \$3,101,766 over the earnings of \$2,274,071 in October of last year. Since the beginning of the present financial year, on July 1st last, the earnings of the road have amounted to \$25,337,792, as compared with \$20,021,251 in the same four months of last year, an increase of \$5,316,541. The net profits for the road since the first of July reached the record of \$10,037,149, which is an increase of \$2,577,041 over the same period last year.

WRECK AND DISASTER IN STORM-SWEPT BAY OF FUNDY

Two Schooners Are Total Wrecks, One Captain Perished, a Seaman Drowned and the Survivors Suffer Terrible Hardship in Wintry Cold and Driving Storm

DIGBY, Dec. 5.—(Special)—The American schooner Emma A. Harvey, 300 tons, Captain Berry of Miramichi, with lumber from Apple River for New York, was driven ashore at Stearn's Cove on the Bay of Fundy, seven miles east of Digby Gut at 6 o'clock last evening and became a total loss. The vessel struck at low water and the captain and crew made immediate efforts to effect a landing, but in getting through the surf one of the crew was drowned. The captain and five other members of the crew reached the shore safely and they wandered about looking for a shelter several hours, during which Capt. Berry died from exposure and the others of the crew were severely frost bitten. One of the crew is not expected to recover. Some distance from where the vessel struck is a small colored settlement, which the survivors at length reached, after five hours in the woods with the thermometer below zero and where much assistance as was possible was rendered them. A couple of men, however, got a boat out and landed.

RESTLESS INDIA WANTS REFORM

Not Five Per Cent of Educated Indians Satisfied With British Rule.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 2.—Rev. Clarence Mc Kinnon, recently returned from Vancouver, speaking of the Hindoo question there makes the following: "While I was in the city of Vancouver an address was delivered before the Canadian club of that city by a representative of British India in the person of Mr. Singh, a journalist of Rawal Pindi, Punjab, India, who is touring the world. The object of the address of Mr. Singh is to call attention to the fact that a request is being made by the people of India for responsible government. The address delivered was by the president of the club to have been one of the best ever delivered before the association. In his address Mr. Singh stated that not one per cent of the educated people of India were satisfied with the present condition of the country with respect to Great Britain. He also called attention to the fact that at the time that the country was constituted an empire there was a promise made that at an early time a responsible government would be granted, and this promise made at that time had never been fulfilled. The situation in India is said to be similar to that which prevailed in the Dominion of Canada sixty or seventy years ago."

FLOOD SWEEPS ARIZONA TOWN

COMMONS HAD A SHORT SITTING

Dealing With Masters' and Mates. Certificates Then Took Needed Rest.

OTTAWA, Dec. 5.—(Special)—The Commons had an afternoon session with private members business and under the new rules adjourned at six for mid-week relaxation. The nationality of masters and mates who shall be given Canadian certificates was the prevailing subject of discussion and the bill requiring masters and mates holding Canadian certificates to be British subjects was given a second reading. Several questions were answered.

SAVED A LIFE LOST HIS OWN

VANCOUVER, B. C., Dec. 4.—A. P. McKeen, of Toronto, aged thirty years, gave his life for a green duck yesterday morning at Pattland, Oregon, in the Cowell River. A green duck had lapped into the river with a truck. Mr. McKeen lowered his foot, himself clinging to the railing. The duck had not only grabbed his foot, but started to climb up, with the result that he pulled his would-be rescuer in. Mr. McKeen was drowned and the duck had saved.

Ten to Twenty Lives Lost and Entire Business Section Ruined.

BISHOP, Arizona, Dec. 5.—(Special)—One of the worst floods in the history of Clifton came down Arizona River and Chase Creek on Monday night. The principal business section of the town was almost completely ruined. From seven to twenty persons is the report of loss of life. Mrs. Joseph Thron and her husband and children were caught in a falling building and killed. Others of the family had narrow escapes. One of the saloons which was washed away carried several men in the torrent. They are believed to have been drowned. A woman and child were lost in a small restaurant which was dashed to pieces in the flood. A number of small frame buildings in which persons were known to be living also were destroyed and it is feared that a number of families perished.

MANY PAPYRI MANUSCRIPTS

Discovered in Egypt, Including All Classes of Literature. One Leaf Gives a Crushing Retort by Our Savior to a Pharisee in the Temple.

LONDON, December 1.—It is now possible to give further details of the remarkable find of papyri as the result of the efforts of Dr. Grenfell and Dr. Hunt, of the Gizeh-Roman branch of the Egyptian Exploration Fund at Oxyrhynchus. The find consists of no fewer than 138 boxes of papyri, ranging in dates from the second century B. C. to the sixth century A. D. They contain fragments of lost or even unknown classical works, and some most important fragments of the unknown Christian literature. The most important find is a vellum leaf containing 35 lines of a gospel, which presents a marked variation from the authorized version. The subject is the visit of Jesus with his disciples to the temple of Jerusalem, and his meeting there with a Pharisee, who rebukes them with their failure to perform the necessary ceremonial purification. In the dialogue which follows, and which resembles in some respects Matthew xxiii. 29, the Pharisee describes with considerable fairness of detail the formalities by himself had observed. Whereupon Jesus delivers an eloquent and crushing reply, contrasting outward with inward purity. As regard the literature of the fragment, the discoverer makes some interesting remarks. He says: "Among the most remarkable features of the fragment are its cultivated style, picturesque and vigor of phraseology, which includes several words not found in the New Testament, and its display of a curious facility by with the topography of the temple and the Jewish ceremonies of purification. There can be little doubt that when the fragment is published, as it shortly will be, the result will be as much controversy between the theologians as was provoked by the discovery of 'The Sayings of Jesus' in another mound. Other Christian fragments of considerable value were found, including a vellum leaf of the fourth century century of the lost Greek original of the notes of St. Peter, which are known only in Latin, and a leaf of papyrus codex of an unknown version of the notes of St. John. The bulk of the section of classical literatures are most important."

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND NOTES

Of a Defunct Bank Being Circulated in St. John Quite Freely—One Bank and Several Merchants Were Victimised by the Bad Money Vendors There.

(St. John Star.) Look out for five dollar bills that show a picture of a man watering a horse at a pump trough, at which a plump pig is also drinking, for they are bad, absolutely worthless! They belong to the long-since defunct Bank of Prince Edward Island, and no less expert concerns than one of the most careful St. John banks, and a large mercantile house have been taken in by them, or you can reverse this saying and remark that the bad money has been taken in by these concerns. Prince Edward Island Bank notes are no good, but the most wary are liable to be fooled by them. They are not counterfeiters, rather they are genuinely made, numbered, numbered and serial currency, handsomely printed and generally devoid of suspicious conditions. They are bad, and do not lose sight of it, for there is no mark of many of them about in St. John's just now. The local bank which accepted one did so through the medium of a teller, but all too late for rectification. The mercantile house accepted one via one of its clerks and thence to the office, where it remained quite a while unidentified. It was discovered that the latter bill was tendered by a respectable young lady, who was quite innocent of any wrongdoing in the matter, and who willingly lent her assistance in attempting to trace it to its knowing perpetrator. After following its migrations several people back, the clue was lost. A cashier who handles thousands of dollars daily, and who knows every bill in common use, as a stamp collector knows his stamps, warns business people, and St. John's folks generally, against these Bank of Prince Edward Island five dollar notes, and bad bills of all kinds. "I have found it to be a calendar fixture with these bad money vendors," he says, "to spring their wad on the people as soon as the Christmas shopping rush commences. They pass a bill then, but in different localities and upon different classes of people. It is a shrewd game, and I have grown to keep particularly wide awake as soon as I find the stores are commencing their holiday boom." So that all people may know at a glance what a Prince Edward Island bank note is like the Star offers the following evidence: First scrutinize the note for the words, "Bank of Prince Edward Island." Then look at the picture; it should be that of a man, horse, pig, etc., at a pump-trough. It is a sort of barfyard scene. For further proof of the bill's worthlessness look for a border of "55" marks at each end. Mind you, it isn't a counterfeit, it's the paper of a defunct institution—and absolutely no cash value.

NOVEL METHOD BY A PRISONER

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 4.—George Gersbush, a Russian political prisoner in Siberia, arrived here on the steamer China yesterday. He escaped from the Akatay prison in Siberia, concealed in a barrel of saurkraut. Gersbush was one of the organizers of the fighting organization of the Russian revolutionary party. He was arrested in May 1903, and in March, 1904, was sentenced to be hanged. As he had never assisted personally in the killing of anybody his sentence was commuted to life imprisonment in the Schlessenbourg penitentiary. He was afterwards transported to the prison at Akatay, near the Manchurian border.
