APSLEY HOUSE. Sale of Former Residence of the Duke of Wellington.

The London Express says:—Apsley House is to be sold if no great objections are raised in certain quarters. The news will come as a shock to the many people who still believe that the famous house at Hyde Park Corner was presented to the great Duke of Wellington by the nation. As a matter of fact, the Iron Duke purchased Apsley House in 1820, when it was the residence of his elder brother, Marquis Wellesley. Originally a plain brick mansion, Apsley House was built about 1785-6 by the Adams for Henry Bathurst, Baron Apsley, Earl Bathurst and Lord Chancellor, who died in 1794.

Pope's Line Exemplified.

"A little knowledge is a dangerous thing," to use the popular misquotation of Pope's line, and so Stewart Arthur Williams has found it. Mr. Williams is an ingenious gentleman of fifty-six, who actually hit upon a new, and for a time successful, form of fraud. He was an attentive reader of that useful but somewhat dry publication, The London Gazette, and particularly of the advertisements emanating from executors of deceased persons. Williams, when he saw a likely advertisement of the sort, would send in an account either for dentistry or for wine supplied. He would make the bogus account seemingly due to some well-known firm, to be paid to himself as accountant, either at an address in Finsbury pavement or at Hounslow. Generally he got the sums he applied for, but at last he was tripped through having that dangerous thing only "a little knowledge." He knew a certain lady was dead and that she died wealthy, and this knowledge inspired him to send in a bill for tooth-stopping. What he did not know the lady's executors did, namely, that she had not had a tooth in her head for years. So his application led to inquiries, and these to his appearance at Middlesex Sessions the other day, where he received eighteen months' hard labor.

He Didn't Need to Be Told.

Sir Robert Ball, the English astronomer, recently was showing a visitor a double star through a telescope, and since his friend was not an expert, Sir Robert thought to improve the occasion by a word or two of information. "One of those stars goes round the other," was his remark. "Yes I saw it," said the visitor. "As a matter of fact, the star in question takes a little over 900 years to revolve around its fellow."

A BIT OF HISTORY. Battle for a Throne Which Paralyzed the Jacobites.

The conversion of England to the Whigs was hastened by a desperate attempt of the Pretender to gain the throne. There was no real hope of success (says Green), for the Jacobites in England were few, and the Tories were broken and dispirited by the fall of their leaders. Lord Oxford was impeached and sent to the Tower, while Bolingbroke and the Duke of Ormond fled over the sea. But James Stuart was as inaccessible to reason as his father had been, and in spite of Bolingbroke's counsels he ordered the Earl of Mar to give the sign for revolt in the North. In Scotland the triumph of the Whigs meant the continuance of the House of Argyle in power, and the rival Highland clans were as ready for a blow as the Campbells under Mar as they had been ready for a blow as they were under Dundee or Montrose. The Scots were on their march southwards when they were met by the Duke of Argyle at the head of 3,500 disciplined troops. Early on the morning of Sunday, Nov. 13, 1715, the Highlanders opened fire so suddenly and well that the Duke's left wing being routed, the fugitives fled with all speed to Stirling, carrying the news that Argyle had been totally defeated. Meanwhile, however, the Duke's dragoons had driven the left of the Highlanders back for two miles, when the right and centre returned from the pursuit, and took him in the rear. He then skillfully withdrew his men to a place of shelter and remained facing his opponents till the evening, when he retired to Dunblane, and next day to Stirling. Mar was content to draw off, and yet boast of, Sheriffmuir as a victory. The battle was so little decisive that it paralyzed the action of the Jacobites, and before the year was out James had fled over the sea again.

Religious Degrees at Oxford.

Furthermore, Oxford must frankly sacrifice the last dyke of the Anglican tradition which still closes the B. D. and the D. D. to all but the Anglican. A Nonconformist to-day can obtain a first-class in the honor school of theology (theology is a branch of education), he cannot obtain the B. D. and the D. D.; in other words, theology as a department of knowledge and research is still corseted in a religious test. The B. D. must be made like the B. C. L., the D. D. as the D. C. L., degrees open without reserve to every worker who can satisfy the requirements of knowledge; and then, and not till then, will Oxford be able to say that in theology as in law, in medicine, history or mathematics, she knows of no sect, no faith, no schools—she recognizes and knows only the servants of knowledge and the seekers after truth. And the university will then have an incontrovertible answer to the red caps that would assault her educational system. You must prove, she will say, that your subject is not merely educationally better in itself, but educationally better than what already is prescribed. To those who urge she is neglecting a branch of knowledge, she will reply: "Prove to me that your subject is a fit branch of knowledge for educated students and serious research, and I will gladly provide you with a post-graduate school in it," and this position will be based on a clear perception of her dual functions as a university.—Blackwood's Magazine.

Monument for Two Purposes.

Among Andrew Carnegie's collection of anecdotes illustrative of traits of Scottish character, one of the oddest is as follows: Sir John "ave" was in Glasgow in 1807, at a time when the populace had it in mind to honor Nelson with a monument. Sir John attended a public dinner one evening whereat the monument came in for a good deal of discussion, and many opinions were advanced as to the style of the inscription that should grace the stone. Finally the visitor was asked to favor the company with his views on this matter. "I think," said Sir John, "that the style of the inscription should be eminently simple and plain. What I should put on the monument would be just the words, 'Glasgow to Nelson.'"

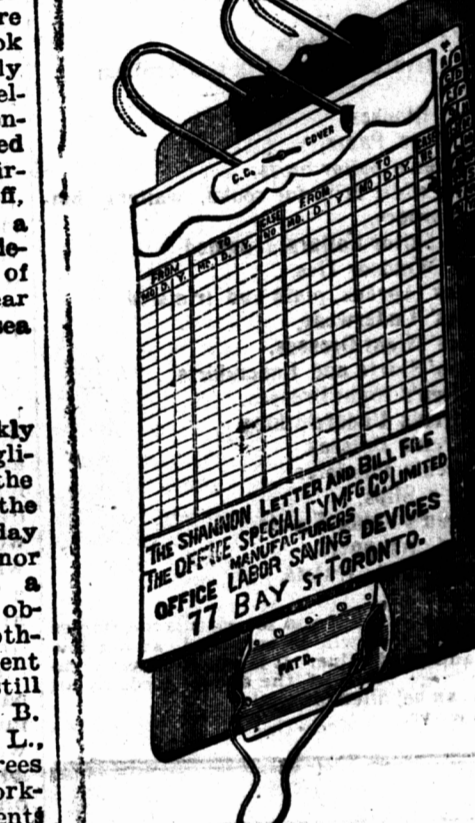
