MINISTERS OF PRESBYTERY

At Charlottetown and within the Hall of St. James Church there on Tuesday, November second, nineteen hundred and fifteen, and at two o'clock afternoon at which place and time the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met and was constituted.

Mr. J. W. McKenzie, Moderator with whom were present Messrs. Dr. Fullerton, Millar, McNeill, R. P. Murray, Wright, Robert Murray, A. McKay, Taylor, J. M. McLeod, Gillis, McHattie, Irvine, A. Sutherland, M. D. McLeod, R. L. Coffin, Lockhart, Greenless, J. S. McKay, D. McEwen, A. B. McLeod, and D. McLean, Ministers, and Messrs. James, Nicholson, McInnis, Campbell, Whitehead, Munn, McNeill, J. McLeod, and John K. McLeod, Elders. The minute of meetings of August third, September twenty-third and twenty-eighth being in the hands of members were held as read and after correction sustained. Minutes of meetings of October sixth and nineteenth were read and sustained.

Dr. Fullerton reported from the Committee on Congregations paying less than the minimum, and moved as follows:

That Presbytery express gratification that five congregations have advanced to the minimum and that others give fair promise of so doing, that in the meantime the Committee be continued and instructed to confer with the Trustees with a view of securing the minimums in all our congregations.

Presbytery adopted this motion. The results of the General Assembly subscription to the standards and publicity were on motion referred to a committee consisting of Messrs. G. Millar, R. Murray and E. Lochart, ministers and Messrs. W. C. McNeill and T. C. James, Elders, with instruction to report at next quarterly meeting.

Messrs. Dr. Fullerton and G. C. Taylor, Ministers and D. McInnis Elder, were appointed a committee to nominate standing committees and to report at March quarterly. Mr. G. Millar presented the request of the British Guiana Missionaries that the Presbytery in lieu of the support formerly given to Messrs McKenzie and Lockhart should raise the same sum viz. fifteen hundred dollars, to be appropriated for the support of a head master for the proposed boys school at British Guiana, the balance to be for the salary of lady teacher in the same province. This proposal had been sanctioned by the Foreign Mission Committee. After considerable discussion the whole question was referred to a committee consisting of Messrs. J. M. McLeod, R. P. Murray, J. A. Greenless, G. A. Sutherland and C. H. S. Sterns with instructions to report fully upon the subject suggesting plans and specially by correspondence with the Foreign Mission and Budget Committee to ascertain whether this amount would form part of the Budget assigned to this Presbytery.

Dr. Fullerton called the attention of Presbytery to the fact that the Church and manse Building Fund had refused the application of the congregation of Murray Harbor North for grant on the ground that it was not an augmented congregation and that therefore they had no power to deal with the matter and moved as follows:

Inasmuch as the Presbytery can find in the rules laid down by Assembly and Synod, no rule confining the operations of this fund to augmented congregations, it requests that the case be re-opened without delay.

Presbytery adopted this motion. Mr. J. W. McKenzie being compelled to leave Mr. J. A. Greenless took the chair. On motion it was agreed that the Presbytery meet on the first Tuesday of February at one o'clock afternoon in Zion Church Hall to vote on Union.

Mr. G. C. Taylor brought up the matter of more careful supervision of young people moving from our congregations of which he had given notice previously and moved as follows:

Resolved that sessions of this Presbytery shall endeavor to acquaint

ministers in other localities of the departure of any of our young people to reside within their bounds, in order that their welfare may be assured through proper pastoral oversight. After lengthy discussion Presbytery adopted this resolution.

In connection with the care of destitute children Mr. Taylor moved seconded by Dr. Fullerton: That Presbytery desires to place on record its appreciation of the noble work done by the Protestant Orphanage on behalf of our orphan children. That we view with pride the success attending the self-sacrificing efforts of those under whose auspices the institution was at first established and since maintained. And furthermore in view of the expense entailed in the maintenance of such an institution, resolved that Presbytery set apart one Sabbath of the Orphanage a special collection be taken for the benefit of the Orphanage.

After full discussion this motion was adopted. Presbytery then appointed a committee consisting of Dr. Fullerton, Mr. G. Taylor and Mr. W. K. Rogers to bring the matter of the Protestant Orphanage before the other Protestant bodies in order that joint action may be secured on behalf of this institution.

The following provisional arrangements were made for the induction of Mr. John M. Macdonald, the Moderator to preside and induct. Mr. John McColl to preach, Mr. G. A. Sutherland to address the Minister and Mr. G. W. Irvine, the people. Mr. D. McLean was appointed to read the edict to be fixed by the Moderator and Clerk. The Moderator of Presbytery being unable to be present at Mr. A. McKay's induction Mr. J. M. McLeod was appointed to preside and induct.

The report of Mr. R. L. Coffin of work done at Falconwood Hospital during the year was approved and ordered to be forwarded to the Home Mission Board, Halifax. Mr. G. Miller reported on the property at Milingash and stated that Mr. Lockhart had visited the locality and saw some prospect of coming to a settlement with regard to the building. On motion the committee was continued and Mr. Lockhart added to it.

The Presbytery's Home Mission Committee was authorized to deal with the claims of Inverness Mission and West River. Mr. G. C. Taylor asked Presbytery to make some provision for Inverness during the winter. On motion the matter was referred to Mr. Roland Davidson who has the oversight to report to the Presbytery's Home Mission Convener.

Presbytery then adjourned to meet in the Hartville Church on Wednesday, November third at eleven o'clock forenoon of which public information was made and this adjournment closed with the benediction.

THE FLEA'S JUMP.

The jumping powers of fleas have been much exaggerated, according to

a bulletin from these insects recently issued by the American Department of Agriculture. The species known as the best jumper. 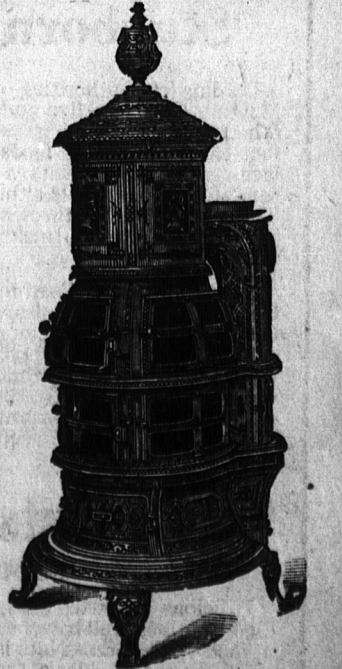

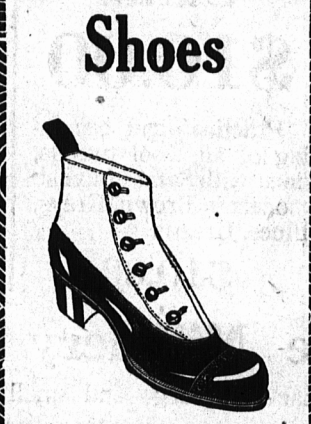
