## SKILFUL SURGERY.

A Rare Operation Performed in New York

ON A BROKEN NECK.

Chances of Recovery Considered—Extraordinary Nerve of the Sufferer

New York, Sept. 25 —As the result of a rare operation performed in Roosevelt Hospital one day last week, Walter A. Duryea, who was taken there more than six weeks ago with a broken neck, is expected to recover.

Physicians and surgeons in all parts of the United States have awaited with keen interest the outcome of efforts they have been making to save Duryea's life. His injury, similar to that which

caused the death of Mrs. William C. Whitney, baffled his physicians for weeks, and several times they gave up all hope of saving his life. They obtained X-ray photographs of his spine, however, and thus located his injury so accurately that an operation which might be successful was decided to be possible.

#### PATIENT GAVE HIS CONSENT.

Edward E. Duryea, father of the sufferer, is a wealthy starch manufacturer in Glen Cove, L. I. Walter is his only son. An operation was proposed to Mr. Duryea and he let his consent depend upon the wishes of his son. Walter, after listening to an explanation of his injury, pluckily directed that the operation be performed. He discussed it with eagerness and looked forward with interest to the time when the surgeons would perform their work.

About a dozen medical men were in young Duryea's room, in a private ward at Roosevelt Hospital, yesterday afternoon when the operation was performed. Louis Duryea, a cousin of the patient, was the only relative present. The operation was begun at 3.45 o'clock and it was finished in forty minutes. At its conclusion this statement was issued by James R. Latrop, superintendent of the hospital:

"By the use of the X-ray apparatus the doctors found that the fifth vertebrae was fractured, and they removed the posterior parts of the fifth and sixth vertebrae, which was pressing on the spinal cord, thus removing the pressure that had produced some of the symptoms.

"The original damage to the cord was so great that it is impossible to say how much benefit will follow the operation, but some at least is hoped for. Removal of the fractured bone and other portions pressing on the spinal cord was successfully accomplished, the patient bearing the operation with great fortitude.

"While Mr. Duryea's condition was such as to render it expedient that the operation be done under cocaine, every preparation was made for the administration of ether. There were present Dr. Robert Abbe, Robert S. Wier and Arthur L. Fish, surgeons, and Drs. Pierce, Bailey and Edward D. Fisher, neurologists, who have been in frequent consultation since Mr. Duryea's injury. Dr. Thomas L. Bennett was also present.

"Dr. Abbe told the family of Mr. Duryea that in this class of cases material improvement did not begin under two or three weeks from the time of operation.

#### PATIENT CONSCIOUS THOROUGHOUT.

Duryea was conscious throughout the operation. Cocaine was applied about the point at which the incision was made, but the patient at the time suffered considerable pain. He was cheerful throughout the operation, and at times showed the keenest interest in what the surgeons were doing, realizing that upon their success depended his life. His coolness and pluck were so marked as to prompt the physicians to make special reference to it in the statement issued by Superintendent Latrop.

After the operation Duryea discussed it with his cousin and the physicians. All present were able to give him cheering views of the prospects, and those who predict his recovery are made more confident by the patient's strong constitution.

Young Duryea is expected to remain in perfect quiet in the hospital for several weeks. No immediate change in his condition is expected to follow the operation.

## SUET FOR BUTTER.

Complaints Made of Adulteration and Inspection Not Strict Enough.

MONTREAL, Sept. 26.—It is claimed by Mr. A. A. Wilson, wholesale provision merchant, that the inspection of butter is not strict enough to prevent adulteration, and he intends to ask the Government to have the inspection improved. A few days ago, Mr. Wilson says, he bought a quantity of butter at 25c a pound, and on tasting it he detected a peculiar flavor which resolved itself into mutton suet. On reducing some of the butter to oil, the suet was quite plain as a more solid residue.
