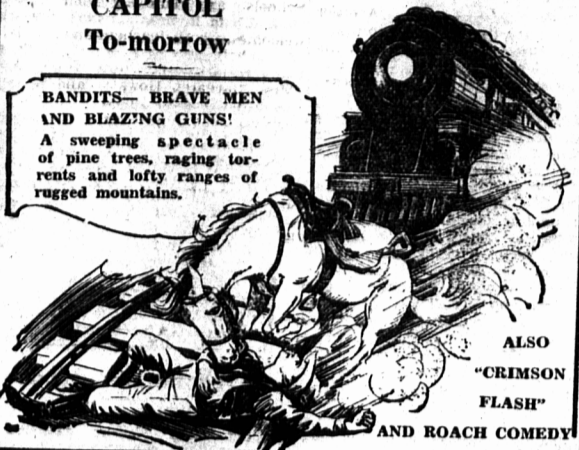

NEW YORK, N. Y., July 17.—The ways of the ballyhoo are devious, but their determination endureth forever. Just a few days ago Tom Heehey, edging into his last month of training before tackling the stalwart heavyweight champion, James Tunney, under the bright lights of the Yankee Stadium July 26, found it necessary to dive into the Shrewsbury River, down by Fair Haven, N. J., and rescue Phil Mercurio, his lanky sparring partner, from a horrible death heath the waves. Tom's success was duly noted in the public prints, so much so in fact that the famed canoe of "Pants" Lawrence, Gene Tunney's favorite guide, suddenly lived up to its name, St. Vitus, and precipitated the learned champion and the even more learned Thornton Wilder, author of "The Bridge of San Luis Rey," into the Kunjamuck River at Speculator, N. Y. The author, taking his canoe ride with the titleholder without even wearing his bathing suit thereby qualified not only for a congressional medal, but the war cross of the knights of the ballyhoo. And any day now Tex Rickard, director of the ensemble, may be expected to take to the water route and fall from his new yacht, the Maxine, now floating idly on the waters of the New York harbor.

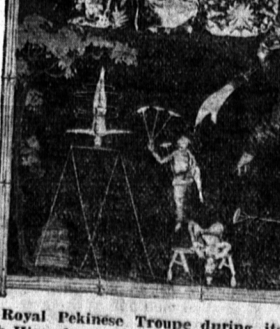

### THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., July 7.—There was a fair demand from the United Kingdom for Canadian western oats here today and exporters worked several loads for nearby shipment. The feature of the local cash grain market was the demand from exporters for oats and sales of no. 2 Canadian Western were made at 10c per bushel over the Winnipeg July option and no. 3 at 6 1-2c over C. I. F. Montreal. The volume of business in the former grade was not large owing to the fact that the offerings were somewhat limited. In sympathy with the weakness in the Winnipeg future market, local prices for cash oats were reduced 2c per bushel. There was no further change in the market for spring wheat grades of flour. OTTAWA, July 17.—In jobbing Canadian egg markets are unchanged today. At Victoria jobbing prices and prices to producers have advanced 2c on all grades. TORONTO—The local situation on this market is unchanged with the demand being keen. Dealers are buying from country shippers at extras 34-35c; firsts 31-32c; seconds 25-26c. MONTREAL—This egg market is dull and weak with the hot weather interfering with the quality of eggs. Receipts from Ontario are larger this week. EDMONTON—The local egg market continues steady. Quality for this time of the year is rather fair. Dealers are quoting country for millfeed showed no improvement and the volume of business was small but the undertone to the market was steady and prices unchanged. A weaker feeling prevailed in the market for standard grades of rolled oats on account of the sharp decline in prices for raw material but no official change was announced. EGGS
