KING ALFONZO'S PERIL.

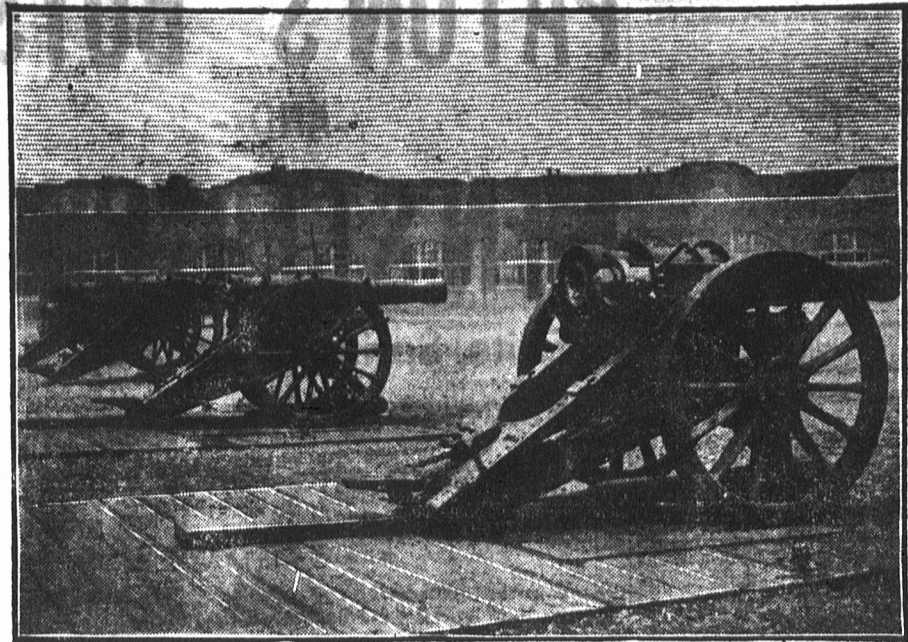

HALIFAX, April 7.—The Agent of Marine and Fisheries received the following telegram last night from the Supt. of St Paul's Island.

"I am advised by the Minister of Marine of St John's, Newfoundland, that a steamer is coming for the crew of the SS Elliott. The Elliott is now sunk in about 14 feet of water."

LANDING ON YALU SHORE.

TOKIO, April 7.—(Special).—A Seoul despatch says that Japanese supply steamers are safely entering the estuary of the Yalu River and landing cargoes at various points on the Korean shore.

COVERED BY WARSHIPS.

It is presumed the movement of supply steamers was covered by Japanese gunboats.

RUSSIAN FORTS DEFECTIVE.

TRANSPORT FLEET SEEN.

An American missionary from Northern Korea reports that he had seen a fleet of forty transports off Haju. It is supposed the transports were carrying the second Japanese army the first three divisions of which were destined to land at Yon-gampho.

BRITISH OFFICERS AT TOKIO.

Three British officers, Ian Hamilton, Nicholson and Haldane, who will be attached to the Japanese army during the war, had a private audience with the Emperor to-day.

POISONED BY SHELL GAS.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 7.—(Special).—A correspondent states that many slightly wounded at Port Arthur have died as the result of poisonous gases emanating from Japanese shells.

THE ANGLO-FRENCH TREATY.

PARIS, April 7.—(Special).—It is learned in official circles today that the Anglo-French colonial treaty is about to be signed and will contain a clause for an open door in Morocco and Egypt.

SCHOONERS COLLIDE.

NEW LONDON, Conn., April 4.—The schooner Mary E. Pennell and William Jones were in collision off Fulkner's Island today. The Pennell has been towed in here damaged. The Wm. Jones is on her beam ends. The crew was rescued.

THE DEATH OF ERNEST DAWSON

A cablegram received by F. L. Haszard K. C. last night brought the sad news of the death in London yesterday afternoon of Ernest Dawson, C. E. of this city.

The deceased had lived in India for the past twenty years and had attained a high place in the Indian civil service. During his residence there he had visited his native province several times, the last occasion being in June 1902. Mrs. Dawson and family have lived here for the past ten years. In March, 1903 Mr. Dawson started for South Africa where he was about to assume a prominent position from the British Government but at Cape Traverse when, about to cross at the Cape he was taken ill and since that time has never fully recovered. In Sept. 1903 however he was sufficiently improved to return to India in order to complete his term in the civil service of about a year which would entitle him to a handsome pension from the Government.

Last March a cable was received that he was about to leave for England to undergo treatment from a specialist for falling eyesight; and Mrs. Dawson left at once to meet him in London where he was expected to arrive on March 20th. Since that time she has been at his bedside till he passed away yesterday afternoon.

The deceased gentleman was in his 46th year and second son of the late W. E. Dawson of Charlottetown. Mrs. Dawson is a native of Scotland. There are also three children, the eldest boy attending the Kingston Military School and the others, a boy and a girl living here.

Mr. Dawson as a civil servant performed many important duties and was connected with many of the large public works in India, particularly in connection with the irrigation of the country.

In 1888 he was commissioned to visit many of the large public works of Canada and United States and his report on that occasion is voluminous and comprehensive.

His observations on that occasion included the methods of management of the river boats, the diking etc., of the Mississippi river and in his introduction to his report he says:

"These notes are compiled by the writer when on special duty on the Mississippi river under the orders of the Bombay Government, the object of this deputation being to study the practice of the Mississippi engineers with a view to recommending the adoption of such of their methods of scientific research and engineering principles as might be suitable to the Indus river."
