Boers Surround Bloemfontein, and Stop Water Supply.

COL. BROADWOOD WAS TRAPPED

Losing Seven Guns and 200 Prisoners—Guns Not Retaken—Scene of the Disaster—Two Officers Escape from Pretoria—The Queen's Visit to Ireland.

OTTAWA, April 2.—(Special.)—The order of General Hutton giving Cols. Kitson and Stone rank superior to Canadian officers has been rescinded and the officers restored to their legitimate places.

FAILED TO PASS THE EXAM.

HALIFAX, April 2.—(Special.)—The following men were examined by a special medical board here and found unfit for service in the Provincial Battalion. DUBLIN, April 2.—(Special.)—The city is gay with preparations for Her Majesty and Irish women are taking much interest in her visit, wearing red, white and blue and pictures of the Queen, Roberts, Kitchener, Powell, etc.

GUNS NOT RECOVERED YET.

LONDON, April 2.—(Special.)—Rumors are current that the seven guns, baggage, etc. captured by the Boers from Col. Broadwood on Saturday have been recovered, but Lord Roberts' dispatches do not say so.

Court of Chancery.

Trainor, administrator vs Lundrygan, re Martin Hinchey's will. The Master of the Rolls yesterday delivered judgment in this suit which was heard before him some time ago. The clause in the will which gave rise to the litigation was as follows: "I give and bequeath seven hundred dollars to Francis J. Trainor of Charlottetown to pay any money that I may leave an order for and also to pay my funeral expenses, also to pay himself for his time and trouble." His Lordship decided that the complainant Trainor did not get the seven hundred dollars referred to for his own use, but that he held it as a Trustee for the purposes set out in the will and as no orders had been given by the deceased in regard to this \$700, it must go to the next of kin. The Court ordered the estate to be administered, an inquiry to be had by Master Longworth as to the assets, debts, funeral and testamentary expenses and also an inquiry as to who are the next of kin of deceased. The costs of the suit to be paid out of the estate.

WHERE THE DISASTER OCCURRED.

The Boers are active all about Bloemfontein, have cut its water supply and stopped communication with Kimberly.

The scene of the British disaster was Mealie Spruit, where the Bloemfontein road crosses the Modder tributary.

The men were caught in a trap, and showed great bravery before surrendering.

THE BOER FORCE—BROADWOOD'S LOSSES.

The Boer force that fought Broadwood is estimated between 8,000 and 10,000 men and his casualties were 350, including 200 missing, who are supposed to be prisoners.

OFFICERS ESCAPE FROM PRETORIA.

Capt. Halden, of the Gordon Highlanders and Lieut. Lemesurier, of the Dublin Fusiliers escaped from Pretoria and reached Lorenzo Marques to-day.

WILL ORATE FOR THE BOERS.

WASHINGTON, April 2.—(Special.)—Webster Davis, just returned from Pretoria, has resigned his position as Assistant Secretary of the Interior in consequence of his trip there and will lecture on behalf of the Boers.
