"For the present the company will be primarily concerned with trade with Bulgaria, Greece, Hungary, Rumania, Turkey and Yugoslavia, it may however conduct business elsewhere if the appropriate occasions arise."

The company will be known as the English Commercial Corporation Limited. It will be registered April 15 and will have offices at Plantation House, London.

"The capital of the company will be subscribed by the treasury," Sir John said. "The company will carry out its work as a commercial and independent entity, subject to general consultation with His Majesty's Government on broad lines of its policy."

The following have agreed to serve on the board of the company: Viscount Swinton, former air minister, chairman; A. Chester Beatty, G. St. G. Beasley, C. P. Lister, G. A. MacEwan, J. H. Hambro and F. H. Nixon.

Will Be Permanent
 The Parliamentary correspondent of Reuters News Agency said it was understood that the company will be a permanent organism, not only a wartime expedient. It will be some time before maximum results are achieved, he said, but it is hoped that the company's operations will increase general trade relations with the Balkans.

British trade in southeastern Europe has been affected in recent years by German competition, the correspondent said. Germany has paid good prices in Reichsmarks for Balkan produce, but the Danubian countries were forced to return to purchase from Germany, and buy the merchandise Berlin wanted to sell. With German industry now absorbed by the Reich's own wartime needs, it was believed that London will be able to make profitable overtures to Balkan manufacturers and Empire raw products.

The Government-financed company will be in a position to help financially British concerns both financially and by supplying information regarding potential markets. Government plans call for close cooperation with the export council headed by Sir Andrew Rae Duncan, president of the Board of Trade.

French Follow Suit
 PARIS, April 4—(CP Havas)—The Chamber of Deputies, by a show of hands, today authorized establishment of a trade council, modelled on Great Britain's, to strengthen French foreign trade during and after the war.

Strengthening of the personnel of the ministry of commerce also was authorized after the deputies were told that the British Board of Trade employs 2,899 civil servants, while the French ministry has only 600.

to the last of the resolution, "and to establish and declare that R. Reginald Bell is the Councilor duly elected for the said district."

This amendment was defeated on a straight party vote.

"After further discussion the following amendment was moved by Mr. McKay:

"That the resolution be amended by adding to the end thereof the following: and that such bill provide for the confirming of the return of the writ of election of Councilor for the Second District of Queen's County and declare the said Councilor's seat vacant since the 12th day of September 1939."

Against strong opposition objection, Mr. McKay's amendment was put to a vote, and carried on the same division.

Premier Campbell spoke to his resolution re the Second District dispute and the discussion which followed was entered into by Mr. MacPhee, Mr. MacMillan, Mr. McKay, Mr. Linnell, Mr. Saville, Mr. Robinson, Mr. MacKinnon, Mr. Mustard, Hon. Mr. McIntyre, and Hon. Mr. McGulgan.

Dangerous Precedent
 Mr. MacPhee pointed out that it would be a dangerous precedent for the House to legislate a man into a seat or out of one. He suggested that the appellant be advised to withdraw his appeal and felt that this would be the best resort.

He said that the statement in the courts suggested by the Premier did not mean that the Courts could not finally decide the matter.

He was expressed by the speaker that where there was a divided Court the appeal should be dismissed and the order of the Chief Justice to the Judge of the Court be carried out.

Premier Campbell said he was contented that the order of the Chief Justice could not be carried out.

Mr. MacPhee said this statement coming from the Premier was an extraordinary one and added that "it has been suggested that the Judge of the County Court would not obey the order of the Premier."

Premier Campbell in reply said, "Not that he wouldn't but couldn't." He added that the Judge couldn't find the ballots as they had been placed in with the general ballots.

Mr. MacPhee cited precedents of former members being elected to the House on recounts.

He cited two cases, one where a Judge threw the counter-facts out and gave the seat to a Liberal, the other case the Judge counted them and also gave the seat to a Liberal. "Either one is wrong," he charged.

Mr. MacPhee said that "it is idle to say that the matter was not discussed in caucus and decided what was to be done for horses and pedestrians."

Premier Campbell admitted that it had been discussed in caucus and the decision reached was to leave it to the private members of the House.

Mr. MacPhee said if the Government with its large majority decided to vote against it there was nothing the opposition could do but speak in protest against it. He warned the members who voted declare the seat vacant that "it would be damaging politically." He suggested that the House delay making a hasty decision.

Mr. MacKay said that he had introduced the resolution in the interest of the people of the Second District.

Asks Delay
 Mr. Robinson asked that the Courts be allowed some further time to consider the matter, and that if at the end of the time nothing was done, then the seat should be declared vacant. He suggested a delay of 6 months be allowed the Courts to reach a final decision.

Hon. Mr. McGulgan declared against delaying the decision of the matter any further as the Courts had been given enough time to decide.

The attitude of the opposition towards the amendment was that it was an effort on the part of the Government to use the majority in the House to prevent a Conservative member, declared elected by the Chief Justice of the Province, from taking his seat.

When the House opened at 3:15 p. m. Premier Campbell rose to a question of privilege about an editorial comment which appeared in the Province, from a newspaper. He emphatically denied having refused to answer a question of the ex-Lieutenant Governor and denied insulting him as was stated in the comment.

The House went into committee on an act respecting the fish and canned fish and canneries inspection with Mr. Saville in the chair. It was reported agreed to.

 which organized and executed the first trench raid, the one which served as a model for hundreds of similar raids by the British and French.

For conspicuous gallantry as commander of this battalion, the 7th Canadian Infantry Battalion, General Odlum was awarded the Distinguished Service Order. While on trench duty he had been made zeizer, the 7th Battalion's attack at Messines on Nov. 16, 1915, was organized with great care and its success led to the adoption of the same technique throughout the Allied Armies.

Purpose of such raids was to obtain prisoners, gather information on the enemy's defences, do as much damage as possible and frighten the small party from the 7th Battalion entered the German trenches during the night, killed about 50 of the enemy, did extensive damage and returned to their own lines with 12 prisoners.

Other Officers To Be Named
 Other senior officers of the second division, including the Brigade Commanders and commanders of the "divisional artillery" and divisional engineers, have yet to be appointed.

General Odlum was born at Cobourg, Ont., in 1880, the son of the late General Odlum. He entered the army in 1900 and served in the Canadian Expeditionary Force in France during the war. He was a member of the board of Governors and recently was made vice-chairman. He is married and has three sons.

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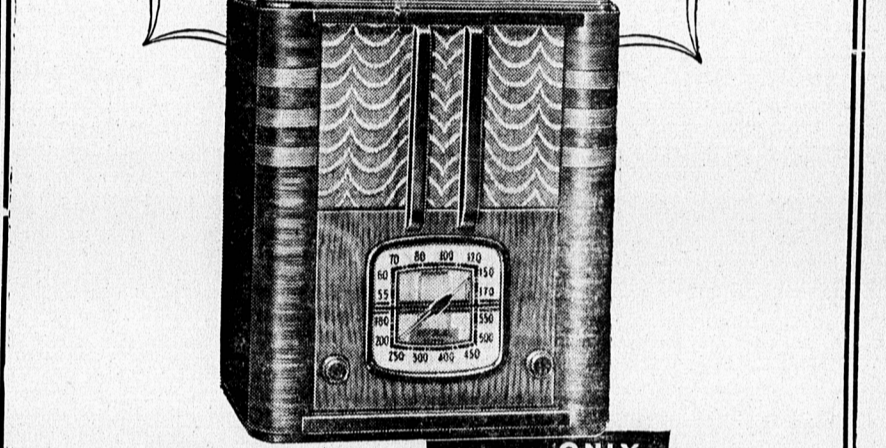

Blockade To Tighten
 He predicted further tightening of the Allies' blockade of Germany, declaring:
 "You can take it from me that one by one, leaks and loopholes are being stopped and that as the war goes on that strangling effect will more and more gain the lifeblood of our enemy."
 Consideration for neutrals, he said, has hampered the blockade, but he said "It cannot be expected that we should allow Germany indefinitely to profit by our scrupulousness and to draw aid and comfort from neutrals who are not our agents and who know in their hearts, whatever they may say, that our victory spells freedom for them whereas our defeat would doom them to slavery."
