FRANCIS DOUGHERTY

One by one the older generation of Emyvale is passing away, but none whose demise has caused more sincere regret than that of the late Francis Dougherty, whose soul left its mortal abode on the morning of May third, at the advanced age of eighty-two years, after a prolonged illness. The late Mr. Dougherty was the last male member of an old and highly respected family, whose history is far famed for honesty, uprightness, and integrity. He was a life long resident of Emyvale, where his memory will remain green, owing to his nobility of character, and the writer offers a personal tribute to the beautiful qualities of heart and mind, that shone so brightly in the life of the late Francis Dougherty. Being the youngest of a large family he remained on the farm with his aged parents, whilst the love, respect, and tender care that he gave them, made him universally respected, and merited their dying benediction. As a husband, father, and neighbor, he was ideal, whilst the stranger and down-trodden were welcome to his home, where hospitality and a word of cheer, so graciously given, helped them to forget the trials incident to humanity, for it mattered not how sombre were the clouds o'er life's horizon, he could observe the silver lining.

His death echoed a typical Christian life. The last rites of Holy Church were administered by the pastor, Rev. Father Herrell. His funeral, which bore testimony to his standing in the community, took place on the fifth, after the rendering of the obsequies loving hands tenderly lowered his mortal remains to mother earth. He leaves to mourn a widow and two daughters. May his Soul rest in peace.
