NEW HAVEN ROAD TO TAP CANADA

NEW HAVEN, April 12—The directors of the New Haven road decided at a meeting yesterday to proceed with their plans to double track the air line from New Haven to Boston.

That the directors voted yesterday to begin the movement by constructing a \$1,000,000 bridge over the Connecticut river at Middletown.

The proposed new route from New York to Sherbrooke (Can.), is to be laid possibly by closing up two gaps. One is between Brattleboro and South Vernon (Vt.) and the other two between Windsor and White River junction.

The proposed route lies over the New Haven road from New York to Springfield, and then over the Boston & Maine from Springfield through Brattleboro and White River junction.
