Summerside Girls Suffer First Defeat In Nine Years In Losing Opening Game Of Semi-final Series.

(Special to The Guardian) Showing no signs of weariness after their long train journey, the Preston Rivulettes rolled up a 4-0 shutout over the gamely battling Primrose squad to take a stranglehold on the Eastern Canada Hockey Championships on their trek for the Lady Zessborough Cup.

Heavy Offensive From the top off in the first period Rivulettes drove a heavy offensive and hemmed the local girls behind their own line. Two minutes after the initial going a bounding cross net shot eluded Dot Harris and lodged in the far corner of the net giving the visitors a one goal lead, credit going to H. Schmuck.

Second Period The opening minutes of the second stanza found the Rivulettes short handed and they contented themselves with staying off the desperate Summerside rushes. Both teams cleared the puck into opposing defensive zones racing in to break up the plays and endeavoring to work the puck to the goal mouth.

Dangerous Rushes The Rivulettes continued a swift and dangerous offensive and drove power play after power play into Primrose territory and only the effective blocking of their defence and clever stopping by Dot Harris prevented the Rivulettes from scoring until after two minutes before the final bell when M. Schmuck drove in her own rebound for the fourth and final goal.

Rated one of the greatest horses ever bred in America and winner of \$261,790 in purses, the seven-year-old son of St. Germans shipped aboard the American Banker. He had as a travelling companion, Cubist, three-year-old colt owned by John Hay Whitney, which occupied an adjoining stall.

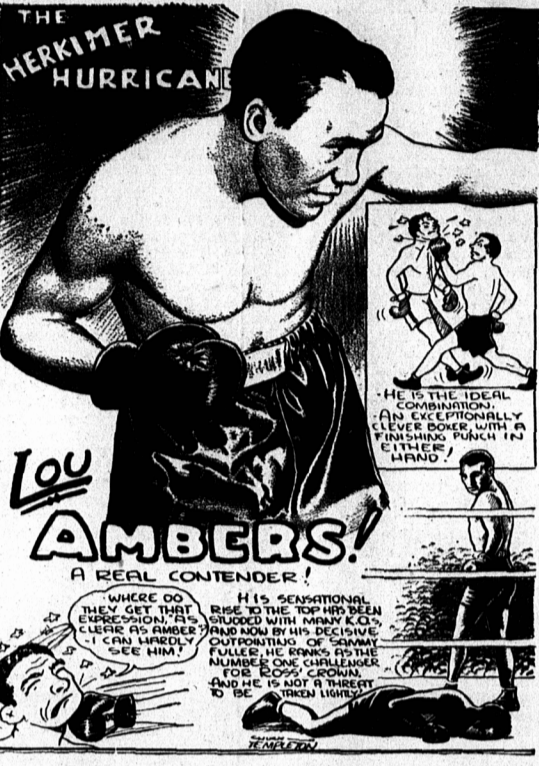

DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

Professor S. A. Rockford is wintering his string of race horses at Port Egin. In a recent letter he reports Alestra (2) 2.16% now coming third, as in wonderful order and slated for a lower record this year. This filly had as her dam The Blonde Lady that was just ordinary as a two-year-old but was a marvelous three-year-old, taking a record of 2.05. Here's hoping Alestra follows the example of her illustrious mother.

Katherine G. 2.07%, the Prof's 2.16 candidate, is fat and round and just champing on the bit. Looking over her races we find that she is much better than average in her class and we would not be a bit surprised to find her tramping our local tracks in seconds better than 2.10 this season.

Single G. 1.58%, the great old warrior that raced twelve consecutive seasons and could beat two minutes when retired, is becoming famous as a sire of fast and game pacers. Here are a few: Dick Reynolds 1.58%, Single Bob 2.05%, Single Ellen (3) 2.07%, Single Hunter 2.11%, Single Patch 2.10%, Single Patchen 2.13, Single Sis (3) 2.07, Single Tom 2.10, Dr. H. (3) 2.06, was one of the best three-year-olds racing last season. He took part in 17 races, winning seven.

John L. Dodge, a former druggist of Grovetown, Ga., who has made a million or two out of dyspepsia tablets, is the most successful breeder-owner-driver of harness horses in the world. His Hollywood brand of speed is known everywhere. This season he has in training five two-year-olds which he claims are the best he ever developed. One has been in 2.17% to cart and another is capable of a 2.12 mile right now. Two others have trotted in 2.20 and the fifth in 2.22.

Princess Etta took a record of 2.15% at Halifax. She was a tough, game mare and over our fast tracks now would be better than 2.12. Colonel Aubrey, trial 2.10%, is out of the same dam.

There's an old horse in the picture lot; I wish he were one "Whom time forgot." But the poor old fellow is gaunt and gray, and I fear he hasn't long to stay. There was a time, when, like a dream come true, He brought me the greatest joys I knew; And through the years he's been a loyal friend, Now, ruthless time marks the weary end.

Perhaps, there is a spirit pasture land For souls of horses who were truly grand; If there is, I know he's earned his place Alongside the grandest of his race.
