COMMANDER PEARY STOLE A MARCH

On Dr. F. A. Cook. He Discovered the North Pole Fifteen Days Before that Explorer Reached that Coveted Point. Cook Has Heard of Peary's Successful Exploration of Discovery.

NEW YORK, Sept. 6.—(Special).—Commander Peary announces April 6th as the date of his reaching the North Pole in a despatch to New York Times as follows: "Indian Harbor, via Cape Race, Nfld., Sept. 6. I have the Pole. April 6th. Expect to arrive in Chateau Bay Sept. 7. Secure control of wire for me there and arrange expedite transmission of log story. Signed Peary."

plant Stars and Stripes at Pole." From New York the Roosevelt went to Sydney thence to Hawke's Harbor where she took supplies and then crossed Davis Strait to Holstenberg following coast from there to Cape York.

When the report Peary had discovered the North Pole reached Copenhagen, Cook said "I hope news is correct." If Peary has reached the Pole his descriptions of that region will confirm mine.

SACKVILLE, N. B., Sept. 5.—Dr. James A. Rogers, of Sussex, has been invited to become pastor of the Sackville Methodist circuit on the expiry of Rev. J. L. Dawson's term in June next. Dr. Rogers' reply will probably be received in the course of a few days. Dr. Rogers has been in the Methodist ministry since 1862. He was attached to the Nova Scotia conference for some time and before taking up the Sussex pastorate he was stationed in Fredericton. He won his D. D. degree from Mount Allison University.

THE EMPRESS MAKES RECORD

MONTREAL, Sept. 4.—The Empress of Britain today made the fastest voyage of the season from Liverpool to Quebec, when she tied up at the wharf at Quebec at five ten p. m. This beats the previous season's record, also made by the Britain, by nearly three hours. It is expected that the present run will stand as a season's record, as the Britain has this summer struck a consistently better gait than her sister ship. By half-past five the first special with passengers and mails for western Canada left the side of the vessel, while the second left an hour later. Both trains reached Montreal by eleven this morning.

TO RAISE COLLINGWOOD.

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 4.—It is probable the Ried Wrecking company of Sarnia will get the contract for the raising of the sunken Canadian steamer Collingwood. The contract is about fourteen thousand dollars. The vessel will receive temporary repairs here and then will be taken to Collingwood. It is badly damaged. Fuller reports from the divers indicate that she has two holes in her side and her tank top is broken. In addition a large number of frames are smashed.
