## Synopsis of Canadian North-West Homestead Regulations.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 3 and 28, not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less. Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agency receive authority for some one to make entry for him. The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years. (2) If the father for mother, if the father is deceased of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother. (3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

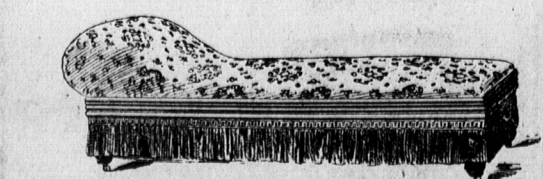

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 5, 1906. KINGSTON'S PURE ELECTION.

As was noticed in these columns recently the Liberal and Conservative candidates and their leading supporters in a by-election to be held in Kingston, Ont. agreed to conduct the election purely. The election has since been held. It was for the Ontario Legislature, the vacancy being caused by the unseating of Mr. Pense, the Liberal member elect, who is also editor and proprietor of a Kingston daily newspaper. The election appears to have passed off very quietly and the Liberal candidate is again elected by a small majority differing very little from his majority at the general election. Another significant feature was that the total vote polled was smaller by some hundreds than before, indicating very clearly that many of the purchasable voters did not this time go to the polls and also that in ordinary elections they had been divided in fairly equal proportions between the opposed parties.

So far as the available accounts go it would appear that the purity agreement was well observed, and if this should be confirmed the election ought to establish a precedent which would commend itself to candidates everywhere. In the first place it is most desirable that persons who are willing to make merchandise of their votes should not go to the polls at all. In their absence the election would be decided by those electors who voted from honest conviction.

The advantages of a pure election are too obvious to need recounting. To put it on the lowest ground, it is the most economical for the candidates and their active supporters. The candidates save the money that would otherwise be expended in bribes, liquors and coach hire. It is a great gain to morality and patriotism to have these baser elements eliminated. The candidates also preserve their self-respect, and they give the best assurance by their honest conduct in the election that they will not sell their votes in Parliament.

If all elections were purely conducted politics would be lifted out of the slough of corruption and venality which now engulfs it; the standard of public life and morals would be raised and the greatest danger which now threatens our national future would be removed. Thus on every hand there would be great gain, and there is no reason to believe that the balance of strength as between parties would be materially affected.

What has been done in Kingston to eradicate corrupt influences from an election can be done with equal ease in a hundred constituencies of Canada if the parties and party candidates will honestly set about it. Kingston has had a rather unsavory reputation in the past for corrupt practices. Why may not the honest and patriotic electors here and elsewhere, while they are still in the majority, join hands to make similar agreements to that carried out in Kingston? No doubt there is mutual distrust between parties, but this can be overcome if a sufficient number of prominent men on both sides will agree to keep the law and use their influence to have others do so.

Saturday was winter again. Hundreds of Liberals over and above the 750 who can be accommodated have applied for tickets to the coming Laurier banquet in Toronto. It is fixed for 21st February.

Quebec is becoming ambitious to be a winter port because the S. S. Montcalm is able this winter to navigate the lower St. Lawrence. This winter has been so exceptionally mild as to be altogether delusive in that regard. Almost any Canadian port has been open to the ice-breakers this winter.
